A meeting of the Board of Supervisors of Butler County, Nebraska was held on the 7th day of January, 2021 at the Butler County Highway 92 Building in David City, Nebraska at 9:00 a.m.

Present were the following: Scott Steager, Tony Krafka, Anthony Whitmore, Scot Bauer, David Mach, Robert Coufal and Ryan Svoboda.

Notice of the meeting was given in advance thereof, by Publication, a designated method for giving notice, as shown by the Proof of Publication attached to the minutes. Notice of this meeting was given to all members of the Board and a copy of their acknowledgement of receipt of notice and the agenda is attached to the minutes. Availability of the agenda was communicated in the advance notice and in the notice to all members of the board of this meeting. All proceedings hereafter shown were taken while the convened meeting was open to the attendance of the public.

The Pledge of Allegiance was recited by all present.

Stephanie L. Laska, County Clerk, called the meeting to order and announced that a complete copy of the Open Meetings Act is posted in the meeting room.

The County Clerk called for nominations for a Temporary Chairman.

Election of Chairman for 2021

Supervisor Krafka nominated David Mach for Temporary Chairman. Supervisor Whitmore nominated Scott Steager for Temporary Chairman. Moved by Bauer and seconded by Krafka to cease nominations.

After secret ballot was taken, the votes were tallied, and Scott Steager was declared the temporary chairman.

Temporary Chairman Steager called for nominations for Chairman for 2021. Supervisor Whitmore nominated Scott Steager. Supervisor Krafka nominated David Mach. Moved by Whitmore and seconded by Bauer to cease nominations.

After secret ballot was taken, the votes were tallied, and Scott Steager was declared the Permanent Chairman for the Board of Supervisors for 2021.

Election of Vice-Chairman for 2021

Krafka nominated David Mach. Moved by Bauer and seconded by Krafka to cease nomination. With no other nominations, the Chairman declared David Mach as Vice-Chairman of the Board of Supervisors.

The Chairman declared the minutes from the previous meeting shall stand approved as presented.

Appointment of Committees

Nebraska Extension – Butler County 2020 Annual Report

The Butler County 2020 Annual Report for the Nebraska Extension was presented to the board and placed on file in the clerk's office.

At 9:43 a.m. the chairman declared the board would take a quick break.

At 9:46 a.m. the board reconvened.

Appointment of County Highway Superintendent for Calendar Year 2021

Moved by Mach to appoint Jim McDonald as the Highway Superintendent for Calendar year 2021. Chairman Steager asked for a second to the motion three times; due to the lack of a second, the motion died on the floor. Moved by Whitmore and seconded by Bauer not to re-appoint but to terminate Jim McDonald as the Highway Superintendent for calendar year 2021. Chairman Steager asked if there was any further discussion. Mach said he would like to discuss the good things that McDonald had done. County Attorney, Julie Reiter, suggested if the board was going to discuss job performance, they may want to enter an executive session. It was determined no other board member wanted to discuss job performance; therefore, Mach continued with his praise of the good points that McDonald had done since he was hired including saving money on the Ulysses bridge, helping negotiate the building price for the Hwy 92 building, completing the Linwood Bridge project, completing the B Rd Bridge replacement and then getting Summit Township to pay for it, and finally completing the one-year road plan in 2020. Steager asked if there was any further discussion; there being none he called for a vote. Upon roll call vote the following voted aye: Whitmore, Bauer, Coufal, Svoboda and Krafka. The following voted nay: Mach and Steager. Motion carried.

Discussion

Reiter suggested with the creation of an opening they needed to get an ad posted to find a replacement and they may need to use a recruiter to find the most qualified person for the job. She also stated they would need to appoint an interim- department head.

Moved by Svoboda and seconded by Whitmore to appoint Randy Isham as interim department head for the Roads Department. Upon further discussion it was decided they should discuss this with Randy Isham and Jim Novacek. Svoboda withdrew his motion as did Whitmore. The board contacted Randy Isham and Jim Novacek and asked if they could join the meeting.

Approval of Utility Permit for David Barry for a buried pipe under Road 34 between Roads A & B in Summit Township Bauer suggested that the board should table this permit until the next meeting. The area where this is located, the farmers are planting right up to the road and the road ditch is level with the road. The depth at which the pipe is being buried needs to be figured out in the event the county would clean out the ditch; they need to know where that pipe is buried and how deep. Randy Isham joined the meeting and agreed with Bauer that the area needs to be looked at.

Discussion

The board asked if Isham would be willing to oversee the crew. Isham said he would be happy to oversee the crew and asked the board to take their time and find the best qualified applicant. Currently they have more than enough work to

complete as they are behind in completing the one-year road plan for 2020. Krafka asked if they had replaced the motor grader operator for the position they had open. Isham said they are still looking. The road and bridge committee told Isham they would help him with whatever they could in the interim.

Moved by Svoboda and seconded by Whitmore to appoint Randy Isham as the interim department head for the Highway Department. Upon roll call vote the following voted aye: Svoboda, Krafka, Whitmore, Bauer, Mach, Coufal, and Steager. The following voted nay: NONE. Motion carried.

Update on Roads

Isham informed the board that the Linwood Bridge may be opened temporarily this winter but then this Spring the road will need to be widened. He stated that they are working on fabricating a tool to break up beaver dams stuck in culverts. Isham stated that he knows there are roads that need to be cleared of the snow, however, it was such a wet snow he was going to send the graders out in the morning when the ground was firm, so they did not rip up the roads. He said they are still putting gravel down in areas. He also stated they are working with Polk regarding culvert replacement on A Road, however, the culverts are on back order. They are still working with Polk County regarding the bridge replacement as well, once he knows more, he will update the board.

Supervisor Whitmore was excused at 10:27 a.m.

Executive Session - Potential Litigation

Moved by Mach and seconded by Coufal to go into Executive session to discuss potential litigation and invite County Attorney, Julie Reiter. Upon roll call vote the following voted aye: Mach, Coufal, Svoboda, Krafka, Bauer, and Steager. The following voted nay: NONE. Absent: Whitmore. Motion carried.

Supervisor Whitmore entered the executive session at 10:48 a.m.

Moved by Whitmore and seconded by Bauer to move out of executive session at 11:35 a.m. Upon roll call vote the following voted aye: Whitmore, Bauer, Mach, Coufal, Svoboda, Krafka, and Steager. The following voted nay: NONE. Motion carried.

Discussion/Possible Action of re-assigning supervision of 911/Dispatch Communications Center and Coordinator to the County Board of Supervisors

Moved by Whitmore and seconded by Coufal to move into executive session to discuss re-assigning supervision of 911/Dispatch Communication Center and Coordinator to the County Board of Supervisors and to invite County Attorney, Julie Reiter, Sheriff Tom Dion and Human Resources Director, Heidi Loges at 11:36 a.m. Upon roll call vote the following voted aye: Whitmore, Bauer, Mach, Coufal, Svoboda, Krafka, and Steager. The following voted nay: NONE. Motion carried.

Moved by Bauer and seconded by Krafka to come out of executive session at 12:15 p.m. Upon roll call vote the following voted aye: Bauer, Whitmore, Krafka, Svoboda, Coufal, Mach, and Steager. The following voted nay: NONE. Motion carried.

Svoboda and Mach suggested the board leave the supervision as it is currently with the Sheriff. Steager said that it is a lot of work no matter who is overseeing the position and center. It comes down to whether the board thinks it's being done correctly. Whitmore commented that is comes down to whether the board thinks it was run better in the past versus how it is being run now. Moved by Mach and seconded by Svoboda to leave the supervision as it is with the Sheriff. Upon roll call vote the following voted aye: Mach, Svoboda, and Krafka. The following voted nay: Whitmore, Bauer, and Steager. Abstained: Coufal. Motion tied. It was asked whether there was a new motion to be made. With no

further motions made and a split vote the supervision will remain with the Sheriff continuing to oversee the 911 Communications Center and Coordinator.

Quarterly Jail Inspection

Detention Center Administrator, Andrew Yost, gave the board a virtual tour of the jail at 12:29 p.m. He informed the board that the jail had its first positive case of COVID last month; as a result their numbers were down in December. They are full now; they received 12 inmates on Tuesday, January 5th. He said that they have had a few issues with smelling gas, however, the fumes never register on the gas detector. He also mentioned to the board that of the 3 water heaters the detention center has only one is functioning right now; they need to look into replacing at least one this year and the other next year.

Human Resources Update

Loges updated the board that as of December 31, 2020 the Families First Coronavirus Response Act: Employee Paid Leave ended. Therefore, as of January 1, 2021 those who test positive and must quarantine will not be eligible for paid leave. Loges noted that this can voluntarily be extended through March 31, 2021. The board agreed they would like it to and therefore asked Laska to put it on the agenda for the next meeting. Loges also mentioned that she will be ready to go live with timeclocks on February 1.

Committee Reports

Steager updated the board regarding the Butler County Development committee; he said they are doing a hotel feasibility study to see if a hotel could come to David City along with other possible businesses.

Discussion

Laska gave Steager an email from Emergency Manager, Mark Doehling regarding the CARES Act funding that has been received. Butler County received \$222,043.46 for Jail, 911 and Emergency Manager reimbursement of wages for March 1, 2020 through May 31, 2020. They are still waiting to receive \$149,956.10 for the Deputy Sheriff reimbursement of wages for the same time period. These amounts do not include the projects that have been submitted. Laska also updated that the chairs, tables, and the wiring of the Hwy 92 building for supervisors' meetings was submitted as a project as well.

There being no further business to come before the board, the Chairman adjourned the meeting at 12:44 p.m. The next scheduled meeting of the Board of Supervisors will be January 19, 2021 at 9:00 a.m.

Notice of this meeting was given to all members of the Board and a copy of their acknowledgement of receipt of notice and the agenda is attached to the minutes. Availability of the agenda was communicated in the advance notice and in the notice to all members of the board of this meeting. All proceedings hereafter shown were taken while the convened meeting was open to the attendance of the public.

The Pledge of Allegiance was recited by all present.

The Chairman called the meeting to order and announced that a complete copy of the Open Meetings Act is posted in the meeting room.

The Chairman declared the minutes from the previous meeting shall stand approved as presented.

Discussion/Possible Action – Destroy secret ballots from reorganization meeting

Move by Mach and seconded by Coufal to destroy the secret ballots from the reorganization meeting. Upon roll call vote the following voted aye: Mach, Coufal, Svoboda, Krafka, Whitmore, Bauer, and Steager. The following voted nay: NONE. Motion carried.

Approval of Utility Permit for Windstream at 1590 Rd 42

Randy Isham, Interim Department Head for the Roads Department, asked the board to table the utility permit until the next meeting because he hadn't had a chance to check it out yet before the meeting.

Discussion/Possible action regarding appointing the Board of Supervisors as the Highway Superintendent until further notice for purposes of the 2021 Highway Incentive payment

Moved by Whitmore and seconded by Svoboda to appoint the Board of Supervisors to serve in the capacity as the county highway superintendent effective January 1, 2021 until further notice, or until a replacement is found for the purpose of the 2021 calendar year Highway Incentive payment, to be issued to the county, by the Nebraska Department of Transportation in February 2022. Upon roll call vote the following voted aye: Whitmore, Krafka, Svoboda, Coufal, Mach, Bauer, and Steager. The following voted nay: NONE. Motion carried.

Update on Roads

Isham told the board they were hauling rip rap to reinforce Road 23 between A & B. He also stated that because of the weather they have been hauling gravel to parts of the county that need it. He asked if the board could approve the Utility permit that was tabled at the last meeting. County Clerk, Stephanie Laska, said she was told to take it off the agenda because the gentleman no longer wanted/needed it. Isham said that was incorrect and asked to have it on the next agenda. Isham informed the board he hired Steve Kozisek as a motor grader operator. He has experience and has the most experience of the candidates that applied. He said that he is technically still down an operator because Tom Kobus has changed his employment status to part-time as needed. However, Isham stated he would like to wait to hire another operator until he knows for sure what a couple of townships are planning to do; he said that sometimes the landfill takes care of it, but primarily it is the County who takes care of it. Whitmore asked if Isham could look at county road 24

west of Highway 15; it needs gravel. The road and bridge committee updated the board on the fence that is needed for the fuel barrels. They finally have 3 bids for the project. They are looking at a chain link fence on the North and West sides of the property and a barbed wire fence on the South and East property lines. The chain link fence is estimated at \$20,000 and the barbwire fence is estimated to be between \$5,000 and \$6,000. It was asked about chain link around the entire property and Road and Bridge estimated that would be approximately \$50,000 because it is a longer span on the East and South sides of the property. Steager asked how much is left to clean up at the old county yards. Isham said there is iron, culvert stands, scrap metal and scrap wood that needs to be cleaned up. He said that because the weather has been so nice, he has had the crews on the roads but if the Supervisors want him to make the old yard a priority, he can certainly do that. Road and Bridge updated that they finally have everything in order for the Bowstring agreement. It was also questioned how much longer the pit would be operable. Isham stated it probably has 4 to 5 years left.

Discussion/Possible action regarding an Overhead Door at the Highway 92 building

Mark Doehling, Emergency Manager, appeared before the board and gave them a quote for an overhead door and concrete work that needs to be done in the Southwest part of the building for Emergency Management and the Sheriff's office. The total quote was for \$15,184.41. The board informed Doehling that he needs to get two additional bids since the project is over \$10,000. Once he has the additional bids the board then would like to know how this will be paid for. It was discussed that the board will need to find space for the sheriff because once they sell the old highway department yard, he will no longer have an impound. They decided they would look at budgets and discuss how to pay for the project at a later date.

CARES Act/FEMA grants update

Doehling informed the board that for the CARES Act the county has received \$222,043.46 for the Jail, 911 and Emergency Manager wages and benefits for March 1 to May 31, 2020. He also stated that they are still waiting for \$149,956.10 for the Deputy Sheriffs for that same time period. He continued stating that he had submitted 6 different FEMA grants for the Courtroom update, glass window in District Court, gloves, masks, and sanitizer along with the tables and chairs and hard wiring of the Hwy 92 building for meetings. He broke the projects up so that if something didn't go through it didn't affect everything else. At this time, he estimates that the FEMA reimbursement will be \$56,311.70 which is 75% of the total project cost. He also stated he was unsure if the state would kick in their usual 12.5%.

Discussion/Possible action regarding a backup generator for communications and internet service

Doehling informed the board that it would be a good idea if during a power outage there was a way to keep the phones and internet up and running. Since the county's phones are VOIP (voice over internet) if there is no internet there are no phones. He said it would be a really good idea to look into this. Also, while he understands the necessity to make sure the generator at the detention center is up and running correctly; it would be nice if they can figure out the issue with the one at the Hwy 92 building. The meeting area is large enough that it would be good to use as a shelter during a natural disaster.

Emergency Manager Update

Doehling informed the board that the Linwood Tower repeater has been repaired, it has a new license with the FCC. The base is poured, and the lower half is installed. He asked who he was supposed to bill for the tower and what was the split for expenses? The board informed him to submit the claim to the County and when the project was over, they would bill the Linwood Rural Fire District.

Discussion/Possible Action – extending the COVID pay through March 31, 2021

Moved by Mach and seconded by Whitmore to extend the COVID pay from the Coronavirus Families First Relief Act until March 31, 2021. Upon roll call vote the following voted aye: Mach, Bauer, Whitmore, Krafka, Svoboda, Coufal, and Steager. The following voted nay: NONE. Motion carried.

Human Resources Update

Heidi Loges, Human Resources Director, reported that over the weekend she received several applications for the Highway Superintendent Position; she had not yet had time to review but would do so and discuss with the Road and Bridge committee.

Review of Employee Accrued Time Report

The employee accrued time report for time period ending 12/31/2020 was presented to the board for review. Steager reviewed with the new board members that employees can accrue 240 vacation hours, 360 sick hours and 150 comp hours for non-law enforcement employees and 240 comp hours for law enforcement employees.

BOARD OF EQUALIZATION (SEE SEPARATE MINUTES)

Moved by Bauer and seconded by Mach to move into the Board of Equalization at 10:00 a.m. Upon roll call vote the following voted aye: Bauer, Mach, Coufal, Svoboda, Krafka, Whitmore, and Steager. The following voted nay: NONE. Motion carried.

At 10:03 a.m. the chairman declared the board would take a quick break.

At 10:06 a.m. the board reconvened.

Discussion

Doehling mentioned to the Board that he will be ordering an updated map of the county that will be 3 ½ feet by 3 feet; he estimated the cost would be approximately \$40.

Claims

Moved by Mach and seconded by Krafka to approve the claims as presented. Upon roll call vote the following voted aye: Mach, Bauer, Whitmore, Krafka, Svoboda, Coufal, and Steager. The following voted nay: NONE. Motion carried.

Discussion/Possible action regarding the 4-H Position

Kurt Mantonya, extension educator and Amy Slama, extension board representative, appeared before the board to discuss the hiring of a full-time 4-H Assistant. Two options were presented, one in which the position is hired by the University and reimbursed by the county and one in which the position is hired by Butler County. The position with the University would cost the county an additional \$15,224 annually and the position with the county would cost the county an additional \$12,040 annually. The University position has benefits that include 15 credit hours per 12-month period that can be transferred to dependents; it also includes 12 holidays, 12 vacation days and sick leave, health, dental and HAS plans among a variety of retirement plans. The County position has benefits that include 12 holidays, vacation which increases with years of service and sick leave, health, life and dental and retirement. The Extension board has recommended the first option with the University. The board asked Laska to look at the budget to see if the position was filled quickly, could the budget dexpenditures were still at 100% remaining due to limited travel that has happened this year. Krafka noted that this position will help keep kids involved and out of trouble and would be worth the added expense. Moved by Svoboda and seconded by Krafka to go with option one; the position will be a University Employee. Upon roll call vote the following voted aye: Svoboda, Krafka, Whitmore, Bauer, Mach, Coufal, and Steager. The following voted nay: NONE. Motion carried.

Committee Reports

Svoboda asked who his contacts with Region V were? The board turned to Laska and asked if she knew; she was unsure but said she would check into it and let Svoboda know. He also asked about the contact for the Landfill if anyone knew. The board members didn't know, however, they said that if they need anything they typically reach out. Svoboda mentioned he had spoken with a landfill employee and he had mentioned they would possibly be re-applying in February.

Discussion

Laska gave Steager an email from Emergency Manager, Mark Doehling regarding the CARES Act funding that has been received. Butler County received \$222,043.46 for Jail, 911 and Emergency Manager reimbursement of wages for March 1, 2020 through May 31, 2020. They are still waiting to receive \$149,956.10 for the Deputy Sheriff reimbursement of wages for the same time period. These amounts do not include the projects that have been submitted. Laska also updated that the chairs, tables, and the wiring of the Hwy 92 building for supervisors' meetings was submitted as a project as well.

Discussion

Bauer presented before the board that the property in Rising City that they had previously discussed will be coming up for auction on February 1, 2021. The board asked Laska to put this on the agenda for the next meeting. Steager suggested that will possibly have to be in executive session. Whitmore looked up the purchasing act and read it for the rest of the Board. Bauer was going to speak with County Attorney Julie Reiter right away to see what the next steps are.

Doehling approached the board again and asked about the alarm system for the building and informed them that it is getting tripped a lot. The board asked Isham how often the alarm is tripped. Isham excused himself to get his phone and showed all the alerts that happened over the weekend. He also said they are working on changing the codes and removing names from the list at the Security Company. Isham told the board that he doesn't always clock his time for checking the alarm, but he is out there a lot and it would add a couple hours each week to his claim, not to mention weekend trips. Isham recommended getting rid of the alarm system and installing better lighting on the building. The board inquired on the fee for the Security company; that information was, unknown, however Laska informed the board that the phone line for the alarm system cost approximately \$162 per month.

There being no further business to come before the board, the Chairman adjourned the meeting at 11:10 a.m. The next scheduled meeting of the Board of Supervisors will be February 1, 2021 at 9:00 a.m.

Notice of this meeting was given to all members of the Board and a copy of their acknowledgement of receipt of notice and the agenda is attached to the minutes. Approval of Utility Permit for Windstream at 1590 Rd 42

Moved by Mach and seconded by Coufal to approve the utility permit as presented. Upon roll call vote the following voted aye: Mach, Coufal, Svoboda, Krafka, Whitmore, Bauer, and Steager. The following voted nay: NONE. Motion carried.

Approval of Utility Permit for Windstream at 4110 V Rd

Moved by Mach and seconded by Krafka to approve the utility permit as presented. Upon roll call vote the following voted aye: Mach, Bauer, Whitmore, Krafka, Svoboda, Coufal, and Steager. The following voted nay: NONE. Motion carried.

Update on Roads

Randy Isham, Interim Highway Department Head, presented before the board that the Roads Dept is working to keep the roads clear, but the wind has been causing them problems. He said with the warmer temps this week they were going to try and get out on the roads and fix the bad spots since the weather is supposed to get cold and stay cold for a while. Isham also said that they will be cutting down trees by the Linwood Bridge, they also have the tree grinder out to clean up trees throughout the county. Whitmore and Coufal both shared compliments they had received after the most recent snowstorm. Whitmore asked Isham about the contract with Ulysses Township (Twp) and how they order their gravel. Isham explained that typically the motor grader operator orders the gravel, however, if Ulysses Twp knows places that need gravel, they can call the office and request the gravel to be ordered; however, because of their contract they cannot just order gravel on their own. Krafka brought up the Bowstring agreement and that they finally have everything in order. They updated the new supervisors that this was approved previously and all that was needed was for the chairman to sign. Julie Reiter, County Attorney, asked if there were any changes made to the agreement that they had, she said that when she had last spoken with Bowstring's attorney he mentioned there would be changes. If that is the case, then the board did not actually approve the agreement that they have at this time. The board asked Laska to put this on the agenda for the next meeting.

Review of Public Defender current expenditures report through January 31, 2021

The board reviewed the current expenditures report for the Public Defender Budget and requested to review it again next month. The report was placed on file.

Human Resources Update

Heidi Loges, Human Resources Director, appeared before the board and asked them if they were aware of a policy in the past regarding safety glasses for the roads personnel. She said she has been approached by approximately half a dozen employees asking about getting reimbursed for prescription safety glasses. The board asked if the Roads Department had a line item for safety equipment, and Laska said yes they do and there was \$17,000 approved for that line item this budget year. They asked how much was left, and Laska reported that they had \$7,673.13 remaining of that budget for the rest of the fiscal year. Loges mentioned that she had asked the Wal-Mart optical center if they had pricing for prescription safety glasses and they said they did. The board asked Loges to look into group pricing for the next meeting. Isham mentioned that the safety glasses are crucial for the employees especially when welding. The board also asked Jordan Jisa if he knew of any grants that would help reimburse safety glasses. Jisa said he was not aware of any, but the County could always turn the receipts into NIRMA, and they may award ASSIST funding for them, its not guaranteed, but it's a possibility.

Loges also updated the board regarding the use of the Hwy 92 building. She said that it is being used by 4-H and extension for Robotics and other activities. She also said that the Sheriff's office, State Patrol, and other Law Enforcement agencies used the facility for training the previous week.

Whitmore was contacted by Diana McDonald and she would not be making it back to the meeting; she asked that opening the Senior Center be put on the agenda for the next meeting.



Committee Reports

Road & Bridge discussed with the board the need to review Randy Isham's current wage since he stepped in as Interim Department Head. The board asked Laska to put it on the agenda for the next meeting. They also discussed that the Highway Superintendent ad had been running for two weeks and they were going to let it run for two more weeks and start interviews after that; there are currently half a dozen applications.

Bauer discussed with the board the Ag Society questions that have come up since they are looking for a new manager.

Whitmore reported that his first Four Corners meeting would be Tuesday.

There was discussion as to when the next hospital meeting would be, Steager said he would contact the Hospital to find out.

Discussion

Krafka discussed with the board that Bellwood is looking to annex property in Bellwood that would include property owned by Frontier Coop. It was discussed who would take care of that road since currently the county maintains it. Reiter directed the board to Nebraska State Statute 18-1716.01 where it states: "Any city or village annexing property contiguous to or abutting upon any part of a county road shall be deemed to have annexed, without further action, all of the contiguous or abutting road at the time of such annexation, except that this section shall not apply to county roads separating counties."

Discussion

Steager discussed with the board an email he received regarding legislation that is being proposed, LB102. This bill would give the board the authority to eliminate the Clerk of the District Court if the office were vacated by the elected official and the deputy did not want the position. Sandy Hoeft, Clerk of the District Court, said that they have been trying to do this for years and that it is a bill to keep an eye on.

There being no further business to come before the board, the Chairman adjourned the meeting at 10:39 a.m. The next scheduled meeting of the Board of Supervisors will be February 16, 2021 at 9:00 a.m.

Notice of this meeting was given to all members of the Board and a copy of their acknowledgement of receipt of notice and the agenda is attached to the minutes. Availability of the agenda was communicated in the advance notice and in the notice to all members of the board of this meeting. All proceedings hereafter shown were taken while the convened meeting was open to the attendance of the public.

The Pledge of Allegiance was recited by all present.

The Chairman called the meeting to order and announced that a complete copy of the Open Meetings Act is posted in the meeting room.

The Chairman declared the minutes from the previous meeting shall stand approved as presented.

Chairman Steager informed all present that if we would lose power due to the rolling blackouts, they would go into the executive sessions that they have on the agenda and then resume the scheduled items once power is restored.

Approval of Applied Connective Quote 1761 to replace Wi-Fi access point in Supervisors room

Moved by Mach and seconded by Coufal to approve Quote 1761 to replace Wi-Fi access point in the Supervisors room. Upon roll call vote the following voted aye: Mach, Coufal, Svoboda, Krafka, Whitmore, Bauer, and Steager. The following voted nay: NONE. Motion carried.

Discussion Safety Glasses for Road Department Employees

Heidi Loges, Human Resources Director, presented prices from Walmart for their safety glasses. The board discussed that they would allow for a safety glasses allowance of \$250. They discussed whether they should designate only Walmart as the place for employees to purchase the safety glasses. Furthermore, they discussed that each department would budget for the expense. Moved by Coufal and seconded by Svoboda to cap safety glasses at \$250 per year, they must be purchased from Walmart and all departments will budget for the expense annually. They had to modify one area to enable a truck to drive through, they have 20 feet through the entire easement except in one area it goes down to 12 feet which will still allow for a pickup to drive through. He said that is the only change to the agreement that was previously agreed upon. Moved by Krafka and seconded by Mach to approve the agreement as presented. Upon roll call vote the following voted aye: Krafka, Whitmore, Bauer, Mach, Coufal, Svoboda, and Steager. The following voted nay: NONE. Motion carried.

Supervisor Krafka thanked Isham for getting this all done.

Review/Approval of a wage increase for the interim department head, Randy Isham

The board discussed raising Isham's wage since he has taken on the responsibility of heading the roads department. They discussed raising it to \$26.50 and paying him retroactively back to when he took on the responsibilities. They also told him they would re-evaluate his wage when the Highway Superintendent is hired. Moved by Whitmore and seconded by Coufal to increase Isham's wage to \$26.50 retroactively back to the date he took over responsibilities and to re-evaluate when the Highway Superintendent is hired. Upon roll call vote the following voted aye: Whitmore, Bauer, Mach, Coufal, Svoboda, Krafka, and Steager. The following voted nay: NONE. Motion carried.

Renewal of Ulysses Township Interlocal agreement

Supervisor Whitmore said that he had this put on the agenda because the agreement ended on December 31, 2020. There were no changes to the agreement, it is the same as the agreement the board and Ulysses Township agreed to last year. The only change was the dates. Moved by Whitmore and seconded by Bauer to approve the agreement as presented. Upon roll call vote the following voted aye: Whitmore, Bauer, Mach, Coufal, Svoboda, Krafka, and Steager. The following voted nay: NONE. Motion carried.

Renewal of Platte Township Interlocal agreement

Isham addressed the board and stated that Platte Township's agreement needed to be renewed as well, nothing was changed from the previous contract except for the dates. Moved by Mach and seconded by Whitmore to approve the agreement as presented. Upon roll call vote the following voted aye: Mach, Bauer, Whitmore, Krafka, Svoboda, Coufal, and Steager. The following voted nay: NONE. Motion carried.

Update on Roads

Isham said there is not a lot to update except that they keep fighting the snow. They have received compliments from Ulysses Township (Twp) regarding snow removal and the extra help that they have received in the area. He noted that they have stayed within the allotted time per the interlocal agreement with Ulysses Twp, however, if they would have gone over, they would have billed them out at the FEMA rates that have been agreed upon. He also noted that they have been fortunate that their equipment has all been in working order which has helped keeping up the roads through the snowstorms. Isham also noted that there are maintenance items that he will be purchasing for equipment such as tires for the graders and the scrapers need some work also. He has purchased culverts for the upcoming Spring and Summer months, noting that they have installed a lot of culverts in the past few years. Whitmore asked if he had heard anything from Polk County regarding the A Rd Bridge, Isham had not but said he would reach out to them. Isham also informed the board that the Roads Dept was deemed essential recently; the hospital reached out to them regarding the COVID-19 vaccine and those that want the vaccine will be receiving their first dose on Friday, February 19, 2021. Isham also said that he plans to start the 1- & 6-year plans, however, once the highway superintendent is hired, they will have to finish it. It was then discussed why some projects are on the Six-year plan; some of the projects may never get done but as long as they are on the plan it can open up state and federal funding if it becomes available.

Approval of Interlocal Agreement with Seward County for diversion services

County Attorney, Julie Reiter, presented the Interlocal agreement with Seward County for diversion services, she said Seward County oversees juvenile diversion, truancy, and the felony drug program, which is different than drug court. Moved by Whitmore and seconded by Bauer to approve the agreement as presented. Upon roll call vote the following voted aye: Whitmore, Bauer, Mach, Coufal, Svoboda, Krafka, and Steager. The following voted nay: NONE. Motion carried.

At 9:42 a.m. the chairman declared the board would take a quick break.

At 9:46 a.m. the board reconvened.

Discussion/Possible Action regarding selling County owned property in Shelby, NE

Don Naiberk, Butler County Hospital CEO, appeared before the board to discuss selling property that is listed as owned by Butler County in Shelby, NE. He informed the board that he has documentation from the Hospital Board meeting from August 19, 1987 showing the board's approval of the purchase of the building. He also provided documentation showing the check number for the purchase. He did not have the deed paperwork at this time. He informed the board that he had been approached by the Village of Shelby to purchase the building. County Attorney, Julie Reiter, said that there is a procedure that must be followed to sell county property and she would need to do some research. The board said they needed more information and wanted to make sure statutes and laws were followed and asked Don to work with Julie to get the process figured out and come back at a later date.

Human Resources Update

Loges presented a wage comparison for the counties that are similar to Butler County and passed it out to the board. She informed the board she would be emailing it to the department heads. She also reminded the board that there are different factors that go into some of the wages and they should take that into consideration when reviewing these wages.

Review/Approval of Interlocal Agreement for the 4-H Assistant position

Kurt Mantonya, Extension educator, presented before the board the interlocal agreement for the 4-H Assistant position. He noted that there has been a lot of interest in the position and once it's approved by the Board of Supervisors, the Extension Board, and the University, they will be able work on hiring the position. Mantonya informed the board that the county attorney has reviewed the agreement and had no changes. Reiter confirmed his comment. Moved by Whitmore and seconded by Coufal to approve the agreement as presented. Upon roll call vote the following voted aye: Whitmore, Bauer, Mach, Coufal, Svoboda, Krafka, and Steager. The following voted nay: NONE. Motion carried.

Claims

Moved by Mach and seconded by Krafka to approve the claims as presented. Upon roll call vote the following voted aye: Mach, Coufal, Svoboda, Krafka, Whitmore, Bauer and Steager. The following voted nay: NONE. Motion carried.

Discussion

The board discussed the Old Highway Dept yard and the need to get the process started so the property can be sold. Reiter said that if it is assessed above \$100,000, they would need an appraisal. It was also brought up that the Sheriff still has evidence being stored out there and that needs to be transferred before the property can be sold. The board asked Reiter to get the appraisal process started.

Discussion regarding LB102

Sandy Hoeft, Clerk of the District Court, appeared before the board to ask for their support in opposing LB 102. This bill would give the board the authority to transfer the duties of the Clerk of the District Court to the clerk magistrates upon vacancy of the office. Hoeft informed the board that the NACO Board of Directors voted to oppose the bill on February 12th. In further discussion, the board agreed the office should stay within the county. The board asked Hoeft if she had examples of letters that other boards were preparing. Steager asked if she would email them to Laska and they would

further discuss the issue after they get out of the executive sessions they have on the agenda. She said she had a couple, she could email them over.

BUTLER COUNTY BOARD OF SUPERVISORS

March 1, 2021

A meeting of the Board of Supervisors of Butler County, Nebraska was held on the 1st day of March, 2021 at the Butler County Courthouse in David City, Nebraska at 9:00 a.m.

Present were the following: Scott Steager, Tony Krafka, Anthony Whitmore, Scot Bauer, David Mach, Robert Coufal and Ryan Svoboda.

Notice of the meeting was given in advance thereof, by Publication, a designated method for giving notice, as shown by the Proof of Publication attached to the minutes. Notice of this meeting was given to all members of the Board and a copy of their acknowledgement of receipt of notice and the agenda is attached to the minutes. Availability of the agenda was communicated in the advance notice and in the notice to all members of the board of this meeting. All proceedings hereafter shown were taken while the convened meeting was open to the attendance of the public.

The Pledge of Allegiance was recited by all present.

The Chairman called the meeting to order and announced that a complete copy of the Open Meetings Act is posted in the meeting room.

The Chairman declared the minutes from the previous meeting shall stand approved as presented.

Floodplain Administrator – Update

Breann Whitmore, Floodplain Administrator, presented before the board that she has issued one permit so far in 2021. She has 6 hours of training completed and is unsure if her out of state training that was approved last year will ever be rescheduled. She asked the board with whom she should speak to at the Roads department about culvert permits. The board told her to speak with Jim Novacek. She updated the board regarding the Platte River flooding and that they are keeping an eye on it.

Discussion/Approval - Lease of County owned real estate in Linwood Township

The board currently has a lease agreement with the Kastl Brothers for a parcel of ground in Linwood Township. The county stores concrete on a portion, however, there is ground that they farm. In the past the board has leased for the taxes due which for this year are \$352.24. Moved by Mach and seconded by Whitmore to approve the lease of county owned real estate in Linwood Township as presented. Upon roll call vote the following voted aye: Mach, Whitmore, Bauer, Krafka, Svoboda, Coufal, and Steager. The following voted nay: NONE. Motion carried.

Human Resources Update

Heidi Loges, Human Resources Director, presented before the board that time and attendance is going live in a few offices today. She informed the board that CPR training is being set up for the courthouse employees. She said she had been asked how the training would be paid for, will it come out of individual budgets? The board noted that the Roads Dept, Sheriff and Detention pay for it out of their budgets, so the offices can pay for it out of theirs. Randy Isham said that it might be something that NIRMA would reimburse through their Assist program; he said he would ask Jordan Jisa to look into it. Loges was asked about the Highway Superintendent position and if interviews have been started? She said she needed to meet with the Road & Bridge Committee to discuss the applicants. She said there are 5 or 6 applicants, and one is licensed. It was discussed whether the board should do the interviews or if there should be a committee setup, they asked Loges' opinion. Loges said she thought a committee would be best. They decided the Road & Bridge committee along with Loges will do the interviews.

Discussion/Possible action – Fence bids for Highway Department Yards

Randy Isham, Interim Highway department head, appeared before the board to present bids for the fence around the Hwy 92 building. He had two bids for barbwire, one for \$4,756 and one for \$6,280. He said the chain link fence portion for both bids was around \$20,000. He requested from the board the chance to rebid the entire project. He said that the gate that they are required to install is only 4 feet tall and was curious why they would need a 6-foot-tall fence around the property. He said that would cut the quote a lot and that he could even look at chain link fence around the entire property as an option. He would also meet with the Sheriff regarding his needs for a fence for an impound. The board agreed he could re-bid the project.

Discussion/Possible action – Approval of Franklin Township Agreement for sale of building

An agreement to buy the 30' x 50' Astro building for \$10,000 from Franklin Township at the old county yards was presented before the board. Moved by Krafka and seconded by Svoboda to approve the agreement presented before them. Upon roll call vote the following voted aye: Krafka, Svoboda, Coufal, Mach, Whitmore, Bauer, and Steager. The following voted nay: NONE. Motion carried.

Update on Roads

Isham updated the board on the roads, he said that the frost is coming out of the ground and they have had to gravel a few areas as a result. He said that there has not been any significant flooding on the county roads due to the Platte River ice jam. Whitmore asked if Plum Creek Township had gotten a hold of him because of water over the road in the area of Road 26 and Road Q. Isham said no, but he would go out and take a look at it. Steager asked what progress they have made at the old county yard regarding clean up. Isham said a gas leak was discovered and it was not able to get repaired until this week, so they have not been there. Isham said he would assign a couple guys to the yard to finish the cleanup. The board asked County Attorney, Julie Reiter, if she was able to get a hold of Ingalls Appraisals; she said to date she had not heard back from them, but she would reach out again.

Discussion

County Attorney, Julie Reiter, informed the board that she had researched the transfer between political subdivisions and the county board can vote to transfer property to another political subdivision. There must be a notice of intent to sell to another political subdivision published 30 days before the sale. Reiter cited Neb. Rev. Stat. section 23-107.01 and advised that the board must comply therewith.

Applied Connective Premium Support Services managed remote and maintenance agreement

Presented before the board was a contract for the phone system maintenance agreement. The agreement was included in the first year of service for the phone system. The additional cost for the maintenance agreement would be \$210 per month. The board asked whether or not the increased cost is worth it and asked how much the hourly rate would be if we had issues. County Clerk, Stephanie Laska, said she was unsure of the hourly rates and asked if the board would like to speak with Applied Connective directly about this maintenance agreement. They said they would and to put in on the agenda for the next meeting.

Request for a deputy to travel out of state for D.A.R.E. training

Sheriff Tom Dion appeared before the board to request that Deputy Marla Schnell be allowed to travel to Iowa April 18th through the 29th for D.A.R.E. training so that she can become an instructor. Moved by Mach and seconded by Coufal to allow Deputy Schnell to travel to Iowa for D.A.R.E. training April 18th through the 29th. Upon roll call vote the following voted aye: Mach, Coufal, Svoboda, Krafka, Whitmore, Bauer, and Steager. The following

voted nay: NONE. Motion carried.

Committee Reports

The handbook committee will be meeting Wednesday, March 3, 2021 at 9:30 a.m. The Law enforcement committee will be meeting Thursday March 4, 2021 at 6:30 a.m.

Discussion

Whitmore said that he was contacted and asked about ethanol waste and would it be transported to the Butler County Landfill. Reiter mentioned that it would be up to the Nebraska Department of Environment & Energy if they can receive the waste product.

Svoboda informed the board that a landfill representative will be contacting each of the board members to discuss the landfill expansion and to see what each board members stance is on an expansion. He was told that if an expansion is not granted then the trash rates will double, and the landfill will become a transfer station. He was also told that they are still wanting to pave the road.

Svoboda asked if there was a way to send out a survey to the public so that they may voice their opinion. It was mentioned that they had several townhalls during the last round and people both for and against the expansion appeared before the board.

At 9:59 a.m. the chairman declared the board would take a quick break.

At 10:02 a.m. the board reconvened.

Presentation of the Seward & Butler County Comprehensive Juvenile Services Community Plan July 1, 2021 through June 30, 2025

Megan Kahler, Executive Director of Seward County Bridges, presented before the board the Seward and Butler County Comprehensive Juvenile Services Community plan for the next four years. A copy of the plan will be on file in the clerk's office.

Approval for the chairman to sign off on the plan as presented

Moved by Mach and seconded by Whitmore to approve the chairman to sign off on the plan as presented. Upon roll call vote the following voted aye: Mach, Whitmore, Bauer, Krafka, Svoboda, Coufal, and Steager. The following voted nay: NONE. Motion carried.

Discussion

Whitmore asked Svoboda in his conversation with landfill representatives if they had said whether or not they will accept the ethanol waste? Svoboda said that they have never given him a definitive answer.

Committee Reports

Steager reported that the Butler County Development board met last Friday, February 26 and at the next meeting they will be reviewing the results of the hotel feasibility study. He also mentioned that there is an opening on the board for the general public if anyone is interested.

Discussion/Possible action regarding potential bond refinance for the Event Center

Mandi Topil, Butler Count Ag Society, appeared before the board to discuss the possibility of refinancing the bond for the event center. The Ag Society was approached by Ameritus and said that they could be looking at a savings of approximately 8% or approximately \$100,000. She asked if the board would want them to go out for bids for the project to see if there were better rates elsewhere. Moved by Mach and seconded by Coufal to have the Ag Society seek bids for refinancing. Upon roll call vote the following voted aye: Mach, Coufal, Svoboda, Krafka, Bauer, Whitmore, and Steager. The following voted nay: NONE.

Executive session – Possible litigation

Moved by Bauer and seconded by Mach to enter into executive session to discuss possible litigation and inviting County Attorney Julie Reiter and Human Resources Director Heidi Loges at 10:17 a.m. Upon roll call vote the following voted aye: Bauer, Whitmore, Mach, Coufal, Svoboda, Krafka, and Steager. The following voted nay: NONE. Motion carried.

Moved by Whitmore and seconded by Bauer to recess the executive session at 10:33 a.m. Upon roll call vote the following voted aye: Whitmore, Bauer, Krafka, Svoboda, Coufal, Mach, and Steager. The following voted nay: NONE. Motion carried.

Discussion/Possible Action regarding Butler County becoming a 2nd Amendment Sanctuary

Members from the public were present to discuss the possibility of Butler County becoming a 2nd Amendment Sanctuary County. Greg Sabata spoke to the board stating that we are one executive order away from more gun laws. He said he feels very strongly about gun rights and that we need to make a statement that Butler County is in support of the 2nd Amendment. Gunslingers LLC owner, Zachery Tate, was present and said that he is all for the idea and does not want more rules regarding guns, however, he questions whether this would have the full support of the sheriff and if the county becomes a sanctuary what implications does it have for law enforcement? The board had several resolutions from other counties as examples. County Attorney, Julie Reiter, cautioned the board regarding the last paragraph of many of the resolutions regarding the Sheriff. He has taken an oath to uphold the State and Federal Constitution and lawmakers can interpret the constitutions differently and a county board should not appear that it is encouraging a Sheriff to not enforce laws.

Discussion continued regarding the resolution that supports the 2nd amendment. Brad Smith questioned the board regarding the authority of this resolution and whether it would change anything. The board said they don't have the authority to change the law. It was asked, if the resolution were passed where would it be available and could a copy of it be sent to senators. The Resolution would be on file in the County Clerk's office and copies could be sent to the senators. It was also questioned whether or not the case law was needed in the resolution. Reiter said she would review the cases cited. The board concluded that they would like to draft a resolution in support of the 2nd Amendment, exempting the last paragraph of the samples provided, and they would like to adopt it at the next meeting. The minutes of the next meeting will reflect the boards support of the 2nd amendment as well as include a copy of the resolution for public viewing.

He said currently the county has 4 to 5 phone calls for phone support a month. She said they have one issue regarding the deputies and how they will clock in and out since they report to duty from home. She offered a solution of putting a program on each of their computers in their vehicles that would allow them to clock in and out; this would add a monthly fee of \$2 per employee per month. Loges reported that Andrew Yost, Detention Center Administrator has resigned effective March 26, 2021.

Loges presented before the board that they have completed four interviews, they originally had six applicants. They currently would like to call two applicants back for second interviews. The board questioned whether they should readvertise the position and broaden the area that they advertised; to hopefully pull in more applicants. County Attorney, Julie Reiter, asked the board if they would like information regarding headhunters. They asked her to get the information to Loges. The board asked if they could appoint three completely different board members for the second interviews. Reiter said, if they are three different members then that would be fine.

Isham told the board that with the rain the county has gotten there has been minimal flooding. They are keeping an eye on the Big Blue River and Clear Creek. He noted that he has been in contact with Polk County and they have a meeting setup. Polk County will line up the bids for the culverts; he said he will be contacting Husker Steel for an updated bid on the A Road Bridge.

Supervisor Mach asked that the resolution included verbiage that was presented at the March 1, 2021 meeting regarding unlawful acts and those unlawful acts not being recognized in Butler County. Reiter said she will not draft a resolution that tells taxpayers they do not have to pay; the county does not have that authority. Jim Rerucha applauded the board for acting on this topic. The board discussed that this resolution may be the first step and if there is further action needed, they can look at that at a later date. WHEREAS, the members of the Butler County Board of Supervisors took an oath to support and defend the United States and Nebraska Constitutions; and

The board is interested in looking at other insurance carriers, however, they are questioning whether there is a universal form for the employees to complete so they do not have to fill out multiple health and medical forms. The board requested to put this on the agenda for the next meeting so it can be advertised.

Update on Zuercher

Myndi Petersen, 911 Coordinator appeared before the board to update on Zuercher. They were supposed to go live on March 29, 2021; however, they recently found out that the software is still non-compliant with jail standards and they were advised by the state not to go live. The board is concerned that they are three years into the program and no where closer to going live than they were before they started. Chairman Steager asked Petersen to schedule a meeting with Zuercher and the 911 liaisons and himself so they can try and get some answers.

Emergency Manager, Mark Doehling said we have received CARES Act money but the projects that were submitted were all for FEMA reimbursement and it will be a while before we see any of that money coming in.

Discussion/Possible Action on Alpha/Numeric plates for 2023 plate series

County Treasurer, Karey Adamy, reported to the board that they have the option to move from 25 county plates to alpha-numeric plates for the 2023 plate series. She also reported that she consulted with surrounding counties and they do not plan to move to the alpha-numeric plates. The board asked for her recommendation and she said at this time since the surrounding counties are not participating it doesn't make sense to change.

Discussion/Possible Action regarding the COVID American Rescue plan and the possible need for amending the budget and/or establishing a fund in the Treasurer's office

County Treasurer, Karey Adamy, presented before the board that the county will be receiving approximately \$1,500,000 as a result of the American Rescue Plan Act. The first payment will be for half and received in May 2021. The second half will be received no earlier than 12 months after the first payment. She also discussed a letter that was sent out by the State Auditor's office suggesting a new fund be established to track the money in and out. The act states that interest earned on the funds will need to also be spent per the guidelines of the act. Adamy also noted that the budget would not need to be amended unless the board would want to expend any of the funds before the end of the fiscal year. County Clerk, Stephanie Laska, reiterated that fact and told the board that we are waiting on guidance from the U.S. Treasury and NACO to make sure the county spends the money correctly. Adamy noted that the funds need to be expended by December 31, 2024 and any money not spent or spent incorrectly would need to be repaid to the Federal Government. Both Adamy and Laska recommended the board take their time to decide what to spend the funds on. The board said they would like to set up a new fund to track the funds and expenditures and would need to create a committee for the project. A resolution will be drafted before the next meeting to establish the new fund.

Discussion/Possible Action - Setting of Hearing to Amend Budget to establish COVID American Rescue Plan Fund

The board discussed that they needed time to determine how to spend the American Rescue Plan Act funds and would not be expending any of the funds in the current fiscal year ending June 30, 2021. No action was taken.

Review of Public Defender current expenditures report through March 31, 2021

The board reviewed the current expenditures report for the Public Defender Budget and requested to review it again next month. The report was placed on file.

Discussion/Possible Action regarding letter from Judge Marroquin regarding Bailiff's Salary & Expenses

Sandy Hoeft, District Court Clerk, appeared before the board to discuss the increase in the Bailiff's salary and expenses, explaining that the salary and expenses are based off the number of cases in each county and Butler County had 57 more cases in 2020 than in 2019, which increased the percentage of the salary and expenses Butler County was responsible for. Hoeft mentioned that the difference in the salary claim versus what she had budgeted is \$7,122.09; this difference could very well cause her budget to be short this year. The board said they would monitor the expenditures and review again in June.

Update on Roads

Isham reported to the board that he has several culverts and a few bridges throughout the county that have become undermined and they are working to repair them as quickly as possible. He is still working with Polk County regarding the culverts and bridge projects. Isham, Whitmore, and Bauer met with the Dairy to discuss road maintenance and conditions; they are hoping this was a step in the right direction to open up the lines of communication so the roads can be maintained when they have large load outs scheduled. Isham was asked about the project on county road 37 between B & C; he stated that the project is going to be very expensive if it does get done. The board asked Isham to look at county road 36 to see if there is anything that can be done about the drainage issues. He said he would take shots of the culverts and try to develop a plan. Isham also reported that he has been contacted by several townships requesting a review of the gravel policy and 44 yards per mile of gravel. The board asked that this be placed on the agenda for the next meeting.

Introduce Anchor Insurance Employee Benefits Self-Funded Consortium Plan

Erick Hancock from Anchor Insurance appeared before the board to ask if they planned to shop the county's health insurance this year and if he could present a plan. He also asked if there would be an RFP that would be published regarding this. The board said in the past companies have come to them and presented their product. He thanked the board for their time and said he would be back with a presentation.

Consideration of membership with the Southeast Nebraska Development District (SENDD)

He updated that Polk County will be working on getting bids for culverts and then they will work to get a date set for the project. He mentioned they are still working towards a plan for the A Rd bridge that would also be a shared project with Polk County.

Jim Rerucha and various townships - Requesting more gravel in the budget for roads

Jim Rerucha and several other township representatives appeared before the board to discuss the gravel policy and the need for more gravel per mail route mile and non-mail route miles. The board asked if they would increase the gravel policy to 66 yards per mail route mile, would that be satisfactory for them. The consensus was that it would be a good start that would need to be reviewed annually. A meeting of the Board of Supervisors of Butler County, Nebraska was held on the 3rd day of May, 2021 at the Butler County Highway 92 Building in David City, Nebraska at 9:00 a.m.

Notice of the meeting was given in advance thereof, by Publication, a designated method for giving notice, as shown by the Proof of Publication attached to the minutes. Notice of this meeting was given to all members of the Board and a copy of their acknowledgement of receipt of notice and the agenda is attached to the minutes. Availability of the agenda was communicated in the advance notice and in the notice to all members of the board of this meeting. All proceedings hereafter shown were taken while the convened meeting was open to the attendance of the public.

The Pledge of Allegiance was recited by all present.

The Chairman called the meeting to order and announced that a complete copy of the Open Meetings Act is posted in the meeting room.

The Chairman declared the minutes from the previous meeting shall stand approved as presented.

Quarterly Sheriff Report

Sheriff Tom Dion and Sheriff's Office Manager, Alexis Buresh, presented before the board the Sheriff reports for January, February, and March 2021. Also presented was the Sheriff report for April 2021. Buresh reported that she had spoken to the Sheriff in Seward County and they give the report monthly and that the monthly report is accepted by the State Auditors; the Sheriff will present the report monthly from here on out.

Moved by Mach and seconded by Coufal to exit the Board of Equalization at 9:09 a.m. Upon roll call vote the following voted aye: Mach, Whitmore, Krafka, Svoboda, Coufal, and Steager. The following voted nay: NONE. Absent: Bauer. Motion carried.

Discussion/Possible Action on a possible gravel agreement with the Landfill for the "R" Road between roads 32-37

Randy Isham, Highway Superintendent, appeared before the board along with Ryan Boyer, landfill site manager, to discuss the potential for a road maintenance agreement. Boyer explained that he did not need a decision today; however, in order to pursue the topic with Waste Connections he wanted to make sure the board was in favor of an agreement. He proposed \$0.25 per ton with that money earmarked for road maintenance and maintenance of machines that maintain the roads. He said that fee could bring anywhere from \$50,000 to \$95,000 annually. He said over the last two years the landfill has spent approximately \$77,000 on road maintenance. Isham reported that since the beginning of 2021 the county has spent approximately \$16,000 on aggregate for the road. The board discussed and agreed that if Boyer pursued the topic with Waste Connections; he should meet with the Landfill committee and the county attorney to draw up an agreement to present before the board at a later date.

Isham presented a utility permit for James Klement, Klement Electric to run a power cable under the road on Road 25 between Q & R. He reported that the township has signed the permit and that he sees no issue with the permit as presented. Moved by Whitmore and seconded by Mach to approve the permit as presented. Upon roll call vote the following voted aye: Whitmore, Mach, Coufal, Svoboda, Krafka, and Steager. The following voted nay: NONE. Absent: Bauer. Motion carried.

Update on Roads

Isham reported that overnight there have been reports of minor flooding by the Sheriff's department. He reported that the ditch crews are out cleaning ditches, he also has the dirt crew out working. He is looking into drainage issues in Plum Creek and Richardson Townships and will move crews there as soon as he can. He mentioned that after receiving the rain over the weekend that they came to work with water in the break room; the roofs will need to be looked at and repaired.

Update on Roads

Randy Isham, Highway Superintendent, updated the board that he is still waiting on quotes/bids from companies for the Generator switch and roof repairs that need to be done. He also discussed with the board the possibility of purchasing a remanufactured transmission for a motor grader, the cost to repair would be approximately \$34,000; the cost to replace would be over \$300,000. The roads department continues to repair roads, clean out culverts and gravel the roads as needed.

Update on Roads continued

Isham was asked if he had started on the 1 year and 6-year road plan and he said yes, but he is currently focused on working on his budget numbers. He updated the board that the first part of July they should receive the culverts for the A Road project with Polk County. They are hoping to get started around August 1st. He also informed the board that he had spoken with Ryan Boyer at the landfill, and they were receptive to the \$0.25 per ton proposal back to the county. He also updated the board that he believes the old county yard is cleaned up so they should be able to move forward with the appraisal.

Discussion/Possible Action regarding the County's contribution for Employee Health Insurance Premiums & creation of Insurance budget as part of the General Fund

The board reviewed the analysis of health insurance premiums which County Clerk, Stephanie Laska, had provided. In order to pay for 50% of the family plans offered, the county would incur an additional \$100,000 in expenses and the big question was where that would come from. Laska also mentioned to the board that currently some department heads budget for what their current employees opt for as either health insurance or the cash in lieu program. She stated that the difference between the employee only premium and cash in lieu is \$402.98 monthly or \$4,835.76. If an employee would leave and that department head only budgeted for in lieu all year, their insurance budget would be short. Some budgets have room else where to make up that difference, however, there are several budgets that do not have that luxury. She suggested to the board that insurance is its own budget within the General fund. Moved by Mach and

seconded by Krafka to create an insurance budget as part of the general fund. Upon roll call vote the following voted aye: Mach, Coufal, Svoboda, Krafka, Whitmore, Bauer, and Steager. The following voted nay: NONE. Motion carried.

Continued discussion regarding the county's contribution for health insurance ensued. Moved by Coufal and seconded by Svoboda to pay 100% of the employee only portion for health insurance and 50% of the remaining difference for families. Upon roll call vote the following voted aye: Coufal, Svoboda, Whitmore, Bauer, and Steager. The following voted nay: Krafka and Mach. Motion carried.

Further discussion was brought up that the board still can switch health insurance carriers. They asked Laska to put that topic on the agenda for June 21, 2021.

American Rescue Plan Act Update

Laska noted that the county had received their first half of the funds in May. She also noted that a lot of the guidance thus far is telling counties to wait until the Interim Final Rule is final after July 9, 2021, to make decisions on spending. Once the rule is final it should be clear what the money can and cannot be spent on. She updated the board that she had met with the David City Administrator, Clayton Keller, on working together on projects. The health departments may be requesting two sums this year, the first would be their normal operating budget and the second would be related to Coronavirus and ARPA Funds can be used for that.

Committee Reports

Emergency Manager, Mark Doehling had asked if the money that was received from CARES funding was earmarked for anything special projects, he is looking at an additional tower for the Highway 92 building. The board said the CARES money was reimbursement for funds already spent, and if he's looking at a new tower, he needs to budget for it and the budget committee will review.

Ag Society will be close to complete for this year's Butler County Fair, but it will not be 100% complete.

A RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING THE EARLY REDEMPTION OF GENERAL OBLIGATION BONDS (BUTLER COUNTY AGRICULTURAL SOCIETY PROJECT), SERIES 2016, OF THE COUNTY OF BUTLER, NEBRASKA, IN SUCH AMOUNTS AND IN SUCH MATURITIES AS SHALL BE DETERMINED BY AN AUTHORIZED OFFICIAL OF THE COUNTY.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS OF BUTLER COUNTY, NEBRASKA AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. Butler County, Nebraska (the "**County**") has previously issued its General Obligation Bonds (Butler County Agricultural Society Project), Series 2016, dated August 17, 2016, in the original aggregate principal amount of \$1,950,000 (the "**Series 2016 Bonds**"), of which \$1,470,000 in aggregate principal amount are presently outstanding. The Series 2016 Bonds were authorized by Sections 23-120 et seq., Reissue Revised Statutes of Nebraska, as amended (the "**Act**"), and a resolution (the "**Series 2016 Resolution**") duly passed and adopted by the County's Board of Supervisors (the "**Board**"). The Series 2016 Bonds were additionally authorized by a vote of the qualified electors of the County voting at a special election held on May 10, 2016. The County issued the Series 2016 Bonds to (a) finance the costs of the acquisition, construction, furnishing and equipping of a multi-purpose facility on the Butler County Fairgrounds, including related site improvements, parking and infrastructure, to be operated by the Butler County Agricultural Society and (b) pay the costs of issuing the Series 2016 Bonds.

Section 2. As set forth in the Series 2016 Resolution, the Series 2016 Bonds maturing on or after December 15, 2021 are subject to redemption at any time on or after August 17, 2021, as a whole or in part, from time to time at

the principal amount thereof, at a redemption price equal to the principal amount of the Series 2016 Bonds so redeemed, plus accrued interest on such principal amount being redeemed to the redemption date.

Section 3. Subject to the conditions set forth herein, the Board hereby authorizes the refunding and redemption of the following outstanding Series 2016 Bonds (the "**Refunded Bonds**"), and the payment of the redemption price of such bonds through and including August 18, 2021 (the "**Redemption Date**"), or such other date as shall be determined by the Board Chairperson, the County Treasurer or the County Clerk (each, including any person authorized to act on his or her behalf, an "**Authorized Officer**"), all in accordance with redemption provisions set forth in the Series 2016 Resolution, after which date interest on such bonds shall cease:

Section 4. (b) upon receipt of this Resolution, the Registrar is hereby instructed to mail notice of the redemption of the Refunded Bonds to each registered owner thereof not less than 30 days prior to the Redemption Date (or such shorter period as may be acceptable to the then registered owners of the Refunded Bonds); and

(c) not later than 10 business days following its mailing of the redemption notice, the Registrar is further directed to file such redemption notice with the Municipal Securities Rulemaking Board and its EMMA portal.

Section 6. This Resolution shall be in full force and take effect from and after its passage as provided by law. The refunding and redemption of the Refunded Bonds authorized by this Resolution are subject to the prior issuance by the County of its General Obligation Refunding Bonds (Butler County Agricultural Society Project), Series 2021 (the "**Refunding Bonds**"). This Resolution shall have no force and effect if the Refunding Bonds are not issued within one year of the date hereof.

A RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE BY THE COUNTY OF BUTLER, NEBRASKA OF ONE OR MORE SERIES OF ITS GENERAL OBLIGATION REFUNDING BONDS (BUTLER COUNTY AGRICULTURAL SOCIETY PROJECT), SERIES 2021, IN THE AGGREGATE PRINCIPAL AMOUNT NOT TO EXCEED ONE MILLION FOUR HUNDRED EIGHTY FIVE THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$1,485,000); PRESCRIBING THE FORM AND DETAILS OF SUCH BONDS; DELEGATING TO THE CHAIRPERSON OF THE BOARD, THE COUNTY TREASURER OR THE COUNTY CLERK THE AUTHORITY TO DETERMINE THE SERIES, AGGREGATE PRINCIPAL AMOUNT, MATURITIES, INTEREST RATES, REDEMPTION PROVISIONS AND OTHER DETAILS OF SUCH BONDS; IMPOSING AN AD VALOREM TAX ON ALL TAXABLE PROPERTY WITHIN THE COUNTY TO PAY THE PRINCIPAL OF, PREMIUM, IF ANY, AND THE INTEREST ON SUCH BONDS; AUTHORIZING THE DELIVERY OF THE BONDS TO THE PURCHASER THEREOF; DESIGNATING THE BONDS AS QUALIFIED TAX-EXEMPT OBLIGATIONS; ADOPTING CERTAIN POST-ISSUANCE TAX COMPLIANCE AND DISCLOSURE PROCEDURES RELATING TO SUCH BONDS; AND AUTHORIZING CERTAIN ACTIONS AND DOCUMENTS AND PRESCRIBING OTHER MATTERS RELATING THERETO.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS OF BUTLER COUNTY, NEBRASKA AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. The Board of Supervisors (the "**Board**") of Butler County, Nebraska (the "**County**") hereby makes the following findings and determinations:

(a) The County is a county and political subdivision duly organized under Section 22-112, Reissue Revised Statutes of Nebraska, as amended, and Chapter 23, Reissue Revised Statutes of Nebraska, as amended.

(b) The Butler County Agricultural Society (the "**Agricultural Society**"), an agricultural society duly formed and organized under the County Agricultural Society Act, Sections 2-250 through and including 2-273, as amended (the "**Agricultural Society Act**") for the purpose of operating and maintaining the Butler County Fair, requested that the County construct, equip and furnish a multi-purpose facility to be located on the Butler County Fairgrounds to be used by the Agricultural Society during the Butler County Fair and by community organizations and individuals throughout the year (the "**Project**").

(c) The County previously issued its General Obligation Bonds (Butler County Agricultural Society Project), Series 2016, dated August 17, 2016, in the original aggregate principal amount of \$1,950,000 (the "Series 2016 Bonds"), of which \$1,470,000 in aggregate principal amount are presently outstanding. The Series 2016 Bonds were authorized by Section 23-120 et seq., Reissue Revised Statutes of Nebraska, as amended, and a resolution (the "Series 2016 Resolution") duly passed and adopted by the Board. The County issued the Series 2016 Bonds to (a) finance the costs of the Project which consisted of the acquisition, construction, furnishing and equipping of a multi-purpose facility on the Butler County Fairgrounds, including related site improvements, parking and infrastructure, to be operated by the Agricultural Society and (b) pay the costs of issuing the Series 2016 Bonds.

(d) Since the issuance of the Series 2016 Bonds, the rates of interest available in the markets have declined such that the County can effect a savings in interest costs by providing for payment in all or part of the Series 2016 Bonds through the issuance of its general obligation refunding bonds pursuant to Section 23-120 et seq. and Section 10-142, Reissue Revised Statutes of Nebraska, as amended (collectively, the "**Bond Act**").

(e) As set forth in the Series 2016 Resolution, the Series 2016 Bonds maturing on or after December 15, 2021 are subject to redemption at any time on or after August 17, 2021, as a whole or in part, from time to time at the principal amount thereof, at a redemption price equal to the principal amount of the Series 2016 Bonds so redeemed, plus accrued interest on such principal amount being redeemed to the redemption date.

(f) By resolution of the Board adopted on July 6, 2021, the Board has duly authorized the refunding and redemption of all or a portion of the outstanding Series 2016 Bonds (the "**Refunded Bonds**") on or about August 18, 2021 (the "**Redemption Date**"), all in accordance with redemption provisions set forth in the Series 2016 Resolution, after which date interest on such bonds shall cease.

(g) The County has on hand no debt service or other sinking fund monies for the payment of principal and interest on the Refunded Bonds other than monies, if any, which are to be deposited in accordance with <u>Section 8</u> of this resolution.

(h) To provide funds for the refunding and redemption of the Refunded Bonds, it is necessary and advisable that the County issue its general obligation refunding bonds in accordance with the provisions of the Bond Act.

(i) It is further necessary that the County adopt (i) policies and procedures to satisfy all applicable requirements of federal income tax law in order to preserve, post-issuance, the tax-exempt status of the bonds described herein and (ii) policies and procedures to satisfy the issuance and post-issuance disclosure requirements of Rule 15c2-12 (as described herein).

(j) All conditions, acts, and things required by law to exist or to be done precedent to the issuance of refunding bonds pursuant to the Bond Act, do exist and have been done as required by law.

Section 2. (a) The Board does hereby order to be issued negotiable general obligation refunding bonds of the County in the principal amount of not to exceed One Million Four Hundred Eighty Five Thousand Dollars (\$1,485,000), designated as "General Obligation Refunding Bonds (Butler County Agricultural Society Project), Series 2021" (the "Series 2021 Bonds"). The Series 2021 Bonds shall be issued only as fully registered bonds, without coupons, on the books of the Registrar and Paying Agent designated in <u>Section 4</u> hereof (the "**Registrar**") in the denomination of \$5,000 or any whole multiple thereof not exceeding the principal amount due on a given date of maturity, and shall be numbered consecutively from one upward in order of issuance. Unless otherwise determined by an Authorized Officer, the Series 2021 Bonds shall bear interest calculated on the basis of a 360-day year consisting of twelve 30-day months, from the Date of Original Issue or most recent Interest Payment Date, whichever is later.

(b) The Chairperson of the Board, the County Clerk, and the County Treasurer (each, including any person authorized to act on his or her behalf, an "Authorized Officer"), is each individually authorized and directed, in the exercise of his or her independent judgment and absolute discretion, to hereafter, from time to time, specify, set, designate, determine, establish and appoint, as the case may be, and in each case in accordance with and subject to the provisions of this Resolution: (i) the Date of Original Issue and the delivery date of the Series 2021 Bonds, (ii) the aggregate principal amount of Series 2021 Bonds to be issued, not exceeding the aggregate principal amount set forth in this Section 2, (iii) the identity of the registrar and paying agent with respect to the Series 2021 Bonds (the "Registrar") (iv) the years in which a principal maturity of the Series 2021 Bonds shall occur and the principal amount of the Series 2021 Bonds to mature in each of such years or such other dates as he or she may determine, provided that the date of final maturity of the Series 2021 Bonds shall be no later than December 15, 2031, (v) the date or dates upon which the Series 2021 Bonds shall be sold, (vi) the rate or rates of interest to be carried by each maturity of the Series 2021 Bonds, such that the true interest cost shall not exceed 3.00%, (vii) the method by which such rate or rates of interest shall be calculated, (viii) the dates on which interest shall be paid on the Series 2021 Bonds (each, an "Interest Payment Date"), (ix) the redemption dates and prices and all terms relating thereto, including the amount and maturity date of any Series 2021 Bonds issued as "term bonds" and the amount of each sinking fund installment therefor, and all terms relating thereto, if any; provided that the Series 2021 Bonds shall be subject to redemption not later than the fifth anniversary of their date of original issuance and delivery, (x) the form, content, terms and provisions of any bond purchase agreement entered into by the County with an Underwriter or any loan agreement between the County and the Lender, all as set forth in Section 7 hereof, (xi) the fee of the Underwriter or the Placement Agent, which shall not be more than 1.50% of the aggregate principal amount of each series, (xii) the purchase price for the Series 2021 Bonds, which shall not be less than 97.00% of the aggregate principal amount thereof (inclusive of the discount of the Underwriter or the Placement Agent and any original issue discount), (xiii) the form and contents of any preliminary and final official statement or

other offering materials of the County utilized in connection with any offering or sale of the Series 2021 Bonds to the public or of any term sheet or request for lenders in connection with any loan, (xiv) the form, content, terms, and provisions of any closing and other documentation executed and delivered by the County in connection with the authorization, issuance, sale and delivery of the Series 2021 Bonds and (xv) all of the other terms of the Series 2021 Bonds not otherwise determined or fixed by the provisions of this Resolution.

(c) Unless otherwise determined by an Authorized Officer in accordance with State law, the Series 2021 Bonds shall be subject to redemption on dates, in the amounts and at the prices as set forth below:

(i) The Series 2021 Bonds shall be subject to redemption no later than the date five years from their Date of Original Issue and any date thereafter, as a whole or in part, from time to time in such principal amounts and from such maturity or maturities as the County, in its sole and absolute discretion, shall determine, at a redemption price equal to the amount thereof, plus accrued interest on such principal amount to the date fixed for redemption, with or without premium, all as determined by an Authorized Officer. If less than all of the Series 2021 Bonds of any maturity are to be called for redemption, the particular Bonds of such maturity to be redeemed shall be selected by lot.

Any Authorized Officer, may designate in a certificate certain Series 2021 Bonds as "Term (ii) Bonds", portions of which are to be redeemed on the dates (each such date being herein referred to as a "Sinking Fund Payment Date") and in the amounts (hereinafter referred to as a "Mandatory Sinking Fund Payment") set forth in such certificate. The Registrar shall select and call for redemption, in accordance with this subsection (c), from the Term Bonds the amounts specified by any Authorized Officer, or any person authorized to act on his or her behalf, in the certificate, and the Term Bonds selected by the Registrar shall become due and payable on such date. If Term Bonds are redeemed at the option of the County pursuant to Section 2(c)(i), the Term Bonds so optionally redeemed may, at the option of the County, be applied as a credit against any subsequent Mandatory Sinking Fund Payment with respect to Term Bonds otherwise to be redeemed thereby, such credit to be equal to the principal amount of such Term Bonds redeemed pursuant to Section 2(c)(i), provided that the County shall have delivered to the Registrar not less than 45 days prior to such Sinking Fund Payment Date a certificate stating its election to apply such Term Bonds as such a credit. In such case, the Registrar shall reduce the amount of Term Bonds to be redeemed on the Sinking Fund Payment Date specified in such certificate by the principal amount of Term Bonds so redeemed pursuant to Section 2(c)(i). Any credit given to Mandatory Sinking Fund Payments pursuant to Section 2(c)(i) shall not affect any subsequent Mandatory Sinking Fund Payments, which shall remain payable as otherwise provided in this subsection, unless and until another credit is given in accordance with the provisions hereof.

(iii) Series 2021 Bonds subject to redemption shall be redeemed in whole multiples of \$5,000. If any Series 2021 Bond is in a denomination in excess of \$5,000, portions of the principal amount thereof in installments of \$5,000 or any whole multiple thereof may be redeemed, and if less than all of the principal amount thereof is to be redeemed, in such case upon the surrender of such Series 2021 Bonds there shall be issued to the registered owner thereof without charge therefor, for the then unredeemed balance of the principal amount thereof, Bonds of like series, maturity and interest rates in any of the authorized denominations provided by this Resolution.

(iv) Notice of redemption of Series 2021 Bonds stating their designation, date, maturity, principal amounts and the redemption date shall be given by the Registrar by mailing such notice by first-class mail, postage prepaid, not less than 30 days prior to the date fixed for redemption to the registered owners at their most recent addresses appearing upon the books of the Registrar (or such shorter period as may be acceptable to the then registered owners). Failure to give notice to any particular registered owner or any defect in the notice given to such owner shall not affect the validity of the proceedings calling the Series 2021 Bonds or the redemption of any Series 2021 Bonds for which proper notice has been given. Notice of redemption need not be given to the holder of any Series 2021 Bonds, whether registered or not, who has waived notice of redemption having been given as provided above or notice of redemption having been waived by the owners of Bonds called for redemption who have not been given such notice as provided above, the Series 2021 Bonds so called for redemption shall become due and payable on the designated redemption date. The County shall give written notice to the Registrar of its election to redeem Bonds at least 45 days prior to the said redemption date, or such shorter period as shall be acceptable to the Registrar. If on or before the

said redemption date funds sufficient to pay the Series 2021 Bonds so called for redemption at the applicable redemption price and accrued interest to said date have been deposited or caused to have been deposited by the County with the Registrar for the purposes of such payment and notice of redemption thereof has been given or waived as hereinbefore provided, then from and after the date fixed for redemption interest on such Bonds so called shall cease to accrue and become payable. If such funds shall not have been so deposited with the Registrar as aforesaid no later than the date fixed for redemption, such call for redemption shall be revoked and the Series 2021 Bonds so called for redemption shall continue to be outstanding the same as though they had not been so called; such Series 2021 Bonds shall continue to bear interest until paid at such rate as they would have borne had they not been called for redemption and shall continue to be protected by this resolution and entitled to the benefits and security hereof.

(c) Interest on the Series 2021 Bonds at the respective rates for each maturity is payable semiannually on each Interest Payment Date determined in accordance with <u>Section 2</u> hereof, from the Date of Original Issue or the most recent Interest Payment Date, whichever is later, until maturity or earlier redemption by check or draft mailed by the Registrar or its successor on such Interest Payment Date to the registered owner of each Series 2021 Bond at such registered owner's address as it appears on the Bond Register maintained by the Registrar or its successor at the close of business on the 15th day (whether or not a business day) preceding each Interest Payment Date (the "**Record Date**") subject to the provisions of the following paragraph. The principal on the Series 2021 Bonds and the interest due at maturity or earlier redemption is payable in lawful money of the United States of America to the registered owners thereof upon presentation and surrender of such Series 2021 Bonds to the Registrar at its principal office.

If any payments of interest due on the Series 2021 Bonds on an Interest Payment Date are not timely made, such interest shall cease to be payable to the registered owners as of the Record Date for such Interest Payment Date and shall be payable to the registered owners of the Series 2021 Bonds as of a special date of record for payment of such defaulted interest as shall be designated by the Registrar whenever monies for the purpose of paying such defaulted interest becomes available.

If the date for payment of the principal of or the interest on the Series 2021 Bonds shall be a Saturday, Sunday, legal holiday or day on which banking institutions in the city in which the principal corporate trust office of the Registrar is located are authorized by law or executive order to close, the date for such payment shall be the next succeeding day which is not a Saturday, Sunday, legal holiday or day on which such banking institutions are authorized to close, and payment on such day shall have the same force and effect as if made on the nominal payment date.

(d) The Series 2021 Bonds shall be executed on behalf of the County by the manual or facsimile signatures of the Chairperson and the County Clerk, or any person authorized to act on his or her behalf. In case any officer whose signature or a facsimile of whose signature shall appear on the Series 2021 Bonds shall cease to be such officer before the delivery of any Series 2021 Bonds, such signature or facsimile shall nevertheless be valid and sufficient for all purposes, the same as if he had remained in office until delivery. Notwithstanding such execution, no Series 2021 Bond shall be valid or obligatory for any purpose or entitled to any security or benefit under this Resolution unless and until a certificate of authentication on such Series 2021 Bond has been duly executed by the manual signature of an authorized representative of the Registrar. Certificates of authentication on different Series 2021 Bonds need not be signed by the same representative. The executed certificate of authentication on each Series 2021 Bond shall be conclusive evidence that it has been authenticated and delivered under this Resolution.

(e) If any Series 2021 Bond is mutilated, lost, stolen or destroyed, the County shall execute a new Series 2021 Bond of like date, maturity and denomination to that mutilated, lost, stolen, or destroyed, provided that, in the case of any mutilated Series 2021 Bond, such mutilated Series 2021 Bond shall first be surrendered to the Registrar and, in the case of any lost, stolen, or destroyed Series 2021 Bonds, there first shall be furnished to the Registrar evidence of such loss, theft, or destruction satisfactory to the Registrar, together with an indemnity satisfactory to it. If such Series 2021 Bond shall have matured, instead of issuing a duplicate Series 2021 Bond, the County may pay the same without surrender thereof upon the performance of such requirements as it deems fit for its protection, including a lost instrument bond. The County and the Registrar may charge the owner of such Series 2021 Bond with their reasonable fees and expenses for such service.

Section 3. The Series 2021 Bonds shall be issued initially as "book-entry-only" bonds under the services of The Depository Trust Company (the "**Depository**"), with one typewritten bond per maturity being issued to the Depository. In such connection the officers of the County are authorized to execute and deliver a Letter of

Representations (the "Letter of Representations") in the form required by the Depository, for and on behalf of the County, which shall thereafter govern matters with respect to registration, transfer, payment and redemption of the Series 2021 Bonds. If the Series 2021 Bonds are issued as "book-entry-only" bonds, the following provisions shall apply:

(a) The County and the Registrar shall have no responsibility or obligation to any broker-dealer, bank or other financial institution for which the Depository holds Bonds as securities depository (each, a "Bond Participant") or to any person who is an actual purchaser of a Bond from a Bond Participant while the Series 2021 Bonds are in book-entry form (each, a "Beneficial Owner") with respect to the following:

(i) the accuracy of the records of the Depository, any nominees of the Depository or any Bond Participant with respect to any ownership interest in the Series 2021 Bonds,

(ii) the delivery to any Bond Participant, any Beneficial Owner or any other person, other than the Depository, of any notice with respect to the Series 2021 Bonds, including any notice of redemption, if any, or

(iii) the payment to any Bond Participant, any Beneficial Owner or any other person, other than the Depository, of any amount with respect to the Series 2021 Bonds. The Registrar shall make payments with respect to the Series 2021 Bonds only to or upon the order of the Depository or its nominee, and all such payments shall be valid and effective fully to satisfy and discharge the obligations with respect to such Series 2021 Bonds to the extent of the sum or sums so paid. No person other than the Depository shall receive an authenticated Bond, except as provided in (e) below.

(b) Upon receipt by the Registrar of written notice from the Depository to the effect that the Depository is unable or unwilling to discharge its responsibilities, the Registrar shall issue, transfer and exchange Bonds requested by the Depository in appropriate amounts. Whenever the Depository requests the Registrar to do so, the Registrar will cooperate with the Depository in taking appropriate action after reasonable notice (A) to arrange, with the prior written consent of the County, for a substitute depository willing and able upon reasonable and customary terms to maintain custody of the Series 2021 Bonds or (B) to make available Bonds registered in whatever name or names as the Beneficial Owners transferring or exchanging such Series 2021 Bonds shall designate.

(c) If the County determines that it is desirable that certificates representing the Series 2021 Bonds be delivered to the ultimate beneficial owners of the Series 2021 Bonds and so notifies the Registrar in writing, the Registrar shall so notify the Depository, whereupon the Depository will notify the Bond Participants of the availability through the Depository of bond certificates representing the Series 2021 Bonds. In such event, the Registrar shall issue, transfer and exchange bond certificates representing the Series 2021 Bonds as requested by the Depository in appropriate amounts and in authorized denominations.

(d) Notwithstanding any other provision of this Resolution to the contrary, so long as any Bond is registered in the name of the Depository or any nominee thereof, all payments with respect to such Series 2021 Bond and all notices with respect to such Series 2021 Bond shall be made and given, respectively, to the Depository as provided in the Letter of Representations.

(e) Registered ownership of the Series 2021 Bonds may be transferred on the books of registration maintained by the Registrar, and the Series 2021 Bonds may be delivered in physical form to the following:

(i) any successor securities depository or its nominee;

(ii) any person, upon (1) the resignation of the Depository from its functions as depository or (2) termination of the use of the Depository pursuant to this Section and the terms of the Bond Registrar and Paying Agent's Agreement.

(f) In the event of any partial redemption of a Bond unless and until such partially redeemed Bond has been replaced in accordance with the provisions of this Resolution, the books and records of the Registrar shall govern and establish the principal amount of such Series 2021 Bonds as is then outstanding and all of the Series 2021 Bonds issued to the Depository or its nominee shall contain a legend to such effect.

(g) If for any reason the Depository resigns and is not replaced, the County shall immediately provide a supply of printed bond certificates, duly executed by manual or facsimile signatures of the Chairperson and the County Clerk, for issuance upon the transfers from the Depository and subsequent transfers or in the event of partial redemption. If such supply of certificates shall be insufficient to meet the requirements of the Registrar for issuance of replacement certificates upon transfer or partial redemption, the County agrees to

order printed an additional supply of such certificates and to direct their execution by manual or facsimile signatures of its then duly qualified and acting Chairperson and County Clerk.

Section 4. (a) The Registrar determined in accordance with <u>Section 2</u> hereof shall serve in such capacities under the terms of an agreement entitled "**Registrar and Paying Agent Agreement**" between the County and the Registrar. Any Authorized Officer is hereby authorized to execute said agreement in a form acceptable to such officer, with the signature of such Authorized Officer thereon being conclusive evidence of the County's approval thereof. The Registrar shall have only such duties and obligations as are expressly specified by this Resolution and the Registrar and Paying Agent Agreement, and no other duties or obligations shall be implied to the Registrar, except as may be set forth in a written agreement between the County and a successor Registrar.

(b) The County reserves the right to remove the Registrar upon 30 days' notice and upon the appointment of a successor Registrar, in which event the predecessor Registrar shall deliver all cash and Bonds in its possession to the successor Registrar and shall deliver the bond register to the successor Registrar. Any Authorized Officer is authorized to remove the Registrar as provided herein if he or she determines such removal is in the best interest of the County. Such Authorized Officer is further authorized to appoint a successor Registrar which he or she deems a suitable successor and to execute an agreement in substantially the form of the Registrar and Paying Agent Agreement but with such changes as he or she shall deem appropriate or necessary.

The Registrar shall keep and maintain for the County books for the registration and transfer of the Series (c) 2021 Bonds at its designated corporate trust office or such other office identified in a certificate of an Authorized Officer. The names and registered addresses of the registered owner or owners of the Series 2021 Bonds shall at all times be recorded in such books. Any Series 2021 Bond may be transferred pursuant to its provisions at the office of the Registrar by surrender of such Series 2021 Bond for cancellation, accompanied by a written instrument of transfer, in form satisfactory to the Registrar, duly executed by the registered owner in person or by such owner's duly authorized agent, and thereupon the Registrar on behalf of the County will deliver at such office (or send by registered mail to the transferee owner or owners thereof at such transferee owner's or owners' risk and expense), registered in the name of the transferee owner or owners, a new Series 2021 Bond of the same interest rate, aggregate principal amount and maturity, bearing numbers not contemporaneously then outstanding. To the extent of the denominations authorized for the Series 2021 Bonds by this Resolution, one Series 2021 Bond may be transferred for several such Series 2021 Bonds of the same interest rate and maturity and for a like aggregate principal amount, and several such Series 2021 Bonds may be transferred for one or several such Series 2021 Bonds, respectively, of the same interest rate and maturity and for a like aggregate principal amount. In every case of transfer of a Series 2021 Bond, the surrendered Series 2021 Bond shall be canceled and destroyed. The Registrar may impose a charge sufficient to defray all costs and expenses incident to registrations of transfer and exchanges. In each case the Registrar shall require the payment by the owner requesting exchange or transfer of any tax or other governmental charge required to be paid with respect to such exchange or transfer. Series 2021 Bonds issued upon transfer or exchange of Series 2021 Bonds shall be dated as of the date six months preceding the Interest Payment Date next following the date of registration thereof in the office of the Registrar, unless such date of registration shall be an Interest Payment Date, in which case they shall be dated as of such date of registration; provided, however, that if, as shown by the records of the Registrar, interest on the Series 2021 Bonds shall be in default, the Series 2021 Bonds issued in lieu of Series 2021 Bonds surrendered for transfer or exchange may be dated as of the date to which interest has been paid in full on the Series 2021 Bonds surrendered; and provided further, that if the date of registration shall be prior to the first Interest Payment Date, the Series 2021 Bonds shall be dated as of their Date of Original Issue. All Series 2021 Bonds issued upon transfer of the Series 2021 Bonds so surrendered shall be valid obligations of the County evidencing the same obligations as the Series 2021 Bonds surrendered and shall be entitled to all the benefits and protection of this Resolution to the same extent as the Series 2021 Bonds upon transfer of which they were delivered. The County and the Registrar shall not be required to transfer any Bond during any period from any Record Date until its immediately following interest Payment Date or to transfer any Series 2021 Bond called for redemption for a period of 30 days next preceding the date fixed for redemption.

(d) The Registrar shall also be responsible for making the payments of principal and interest as the same fall due upon the Series 2021 Bonds from funds provided by the County for such purposes. On or before each principal or interest due date, without further order of the Board, the County Treasurer shall transmit or cause to be transmitted to the Registrar money sufficient for payment of all principal and interest then due. Payments of interest due upon the Series 2021 Bonds prior to maturity or redemption shall be made by the Registrar by mailing a check in the amount due

for such interest on each interest payment date to the registered owner of each Series 2021 Bond to such owner's registered address as shown on the books of registration as required to be maintained under this <u>Section 4</u>. Payments of principal due at maturity or at any date fixed for redemption prior to maturity, together with any accrued interest then due, shall be made by the Registrar upon presentation and surrender of such Series 2021 Bond. The County and the Registrar may treat the registered owner of any Series 2021 Bonds as the absolute owner of such Series 2021 Bond for purposes of making payments thereon and for all other purposes. All payments on account of interest or principal made to the registered owner of any Bond shall be valid and effectual and shall be a discharge of the County and the Registrar in respect of the liability upon the Series 2021 Bonds or claims for interest to the extent of the amount or amounts so paid.

Section 5. The Series 2021 Bonds shall be in substantially the following form:

Committee Reports

The safety committee had met before the Board meeting this morning. Whitmore presented the Sheriff's dog deployment record that was requested at the previous meeting.

Discussion

Svoboda said he had a concerned citizen asking questions about trees that are on personal property that are hanging over the road, he asked who is responsible. It was discussed that the property owner is responsible for that, however, there are times when the county will address tree issues if there could be a safety issue.

The board also discussed the need for nominating a vice-chair that would replace the chairman in his absence, instead of nominating one at the time of absence. They will address at the first meeting in August.

Bauer asked County Attorney, Julie Reiter, if she had any update regarding the appraisal process at the old county yard location. She said her last contact was approximately 4 weeks ago at which time the appraiser said it would take him approximately 4 to 6 weeks to get to the project.

Review of proposed Purchase Agreement for Sale of Real Estate to Shelby and authorize publication of County's intent to sell real estate

County Attorney, Julie Reiter, presented the board with a proposed purchase agreement for the sale of real estate to the Village of Shelby. The board reviewed the proposal. Moved by Whitmore and seconded by Coufal to authorize publication of the County's intent to sell real estate under the proposed terms of the purchase agreement. Upon roll call vote the following voted aye: Whitmore, Coufal, Svoboda, Krafka, Bauer, and Mach. The following voted nay: NONE. Motion carried.

At 10:34 a.m. the chairman declared the board would take a quick break.

At 10:45 a.m. the board reconvened.

Discussion/Possible Action regarding the purchase of Storage Cabinet Equipment for the Clerk of the District Court

Sandy Hoeft, Clerk of the District Court, appeared before the board with 3 informal bids to purchase storage cabinet equipment in her office. Moved by Whitmore and seconded by Coufal to approve the purchase of storage cabinet equipment from Midwest Storage Solutions, Inc. in the amount of \$19,216.00. Upon roll call vote the following voted aye: Coufal, Whitmore, Bauer, Krafka, Svoboda, and Mach. The following voted nay: NONE. Motion carried.

Appoint Mark Doehling as representative for FEMA Disaster DR 4521

Mark Doehling, Emergency Manager, appeared before the board to ask them to appoint him as the FEMA Representative for DR 4521; COVID-19 disaster. Moved by Whitmore and seconded by Coufal to appoint Mark Doehling as representative for FEMA Disaster DR 4521. Upon roll call vote the following voted aye: Whitmore, Coufal, Svoboda, Krafka, Bauer, and Mach. The following voted nay: NONE. Motion carried.

Discussion/Possible action regarding the Dispatch Communication Equipment in the Sheriff's office

Doehling explained that an unexpected expense for the Linwood Tower has arisen regarding reprogramming the Sheriff's office equipment. He said that the worst-case scenario it will cost around \$5,000 to get the equipment up and functioning correctly. He said he believes the county, along with help from the local fire department, may be able to reduce installation costs and bring that number down. However, he wanted to know who should pay for it. Currently the county has a Memorandum of Understanding with the Linwood Rural Fire District stating that they would pay a total of \$20,000 for the project, that amount was satisfied in June with claims that had been presented to the board for payment at the June 21, 2021, meeting. The board suggested that Doehling speak with the Linwood Rural board about the cost and continue with the project from there.

Discussion/Possible action regarding the capital expenditure of adding an additional 911 Tower

Doehling also discussed with the board some of the vulnerabilities of the 911 Towers in Butler County and proposed a solution of adding a tower at the Hwy 92 location. He said the approximate cost of the project would be \$75,000 to \$100,000. The board suggested he add it to the budget and the budget committee would discuss if the budget can handle that cost and present back to the board at a later date.

Discussion regarding the Butler County Landfill and the height requirements/restrictions

Kelly Danielson and Ryan Boyer from the Butler County Landfill were present for questions regarding the landfill and the height requirements. Currently the landfill is at approximately 1,760 feet and the landfill is permitted for 1,820 feet. Danielson reported that the life expectancy of the landfill without an expansion is approximately 10 years. He also mentioned if people have concerns about the smell; if they could contact them directly, they could drive to the concerned individual's location and possibly identify the smell and work to fix it. He said they typically get the complaints second hand, from NDEQ or a supervisor and by then the smell has diminished and they cannot identify it. The board was invited to visit the landfill to see the process of how the ground is prepped and the liners are installed for the cells.

Human Resources continued

Whitmore asked the board if they thought they should postpone Randy Isham's evaluation until he has been doing the job for at least six months. The board agreed and asked Loges to schedule Isham's at a later date.

At 11:33 a.m. the chairman declared the board would take a short recess until 1:00 p.m. for the Board of Equalization meeting.

At 12:58 p.m. the chairman reconvened the meeting.

Discussion

Whitmore asked the board if they had been approached by anyone regarding the President's 30 by 30 plan. He stated that several counties are against the program and have been adopting resolutions as a result. The board asked Laska to put this topic on the agenda for the next meeting.

Notice of the meeting was given in advance thereof, by Publication, a designated method for giving notice, as shown by the Proof of Publication attached to the minutes. Notice of this meeting was given to all members of the Board and a copy of their acknowledgement of receipt of notice and the agenda is attached to the minutes. Availability of the agenda was communicated in the advance notice and in the notice to all members of the board of this meeting. All proceedings hereafter shown were taken while the convened meeting was open to the attendance of the public.

The Pledge of Allegiance was recited by all present.

The Chairman called the meeting to order and announced that a complete copy of the Open Meetings Act is posted in the meeting room.

The Chairman declared the minutes from the previous meeting shall stand approved as presented.

Discussion/Possible Action regarding Windstream Utility Permit for 512 Road 43, Northwest of Bellwood

Highway Superintendent, Randy Isham, presented the board with a utility permit for Windstream for 512 Road 43, Northwest of Bellwood. Roads Update

Isham updated the board about an NRD road dam issue that they will be correcting. The joint project with Polk County started today and should be complete by the end of the week. He's had a lot of culvert issues in Supervisor District 7 that have caused him to pull off other projects to correct. He's hoping with the weather in the near future to get caught up. He also informed the board that there are some issues with the Plum Creek motor grader operator, he is cutting a ditch in the road before the ditch and the water isn't draining correctly when it rains.

Open Trailer Bids

One bid was received for the trailer bids, it was from Siouxland Trailer for \$66,500. The board asked if they could contact other counties that have bought from them before; the sales rep present said he would get a list to Randy so the board can call and even go look at the trailers. The board decided they would address accepting the bid at the next board meeting on August 2, 2021.

County Treasurer's Statement January 1, 2021 to June 30, 2021

The County Treasurer's Statement for January 1, 2021 through June 30, 2021 was accepted and placed on file.



The employee accrued time report as of June 30, 2021 was presented to the board for their review.

Preliminary 2021-2022 County Budget Report

County Clerk, Stephanie Laska, reported to the board that she met with the budget committee regarding the elected officials and department heads requests for the upcoming budget year. They will be meeting with departments later this week.

Aging Partners Annual Report and Funding Request

Randy Jones appeared before the board to give the annual report and funding request for Aging Partners. The annual request for 2021-2022 is \$24,559.

Discussion regarding the potential need for a future van purchase

Diana McDonald, Senior Center Director, appeared before the board to discuss the potential need to purchase a minivan for the Senior Center. The current van's transmission went out and it will cost approximately \$4,000 to repair. McDonald said there is not a cost share for the purchase of the minivan, however, the fuel and repairs would be cost shared. The board asked McDonald if the repair of the transmission would be cost shared. She said she would look into it and report back when she knows more information.

Authorize chairman to sign NDOT agreement for public transportation assistance

McDonald presented that this agreement is for the 100% funded vehicle that the board had already approved. Moved by Krafka and seconded by Coufal to authorize the chairman to sign the agreement as presented. Upon roll call vote the following voted aye: Krafka, Svoboda, Coufal, Whitmore, Bauer, and Mach. The following voted nay: NONE. Motion carried.

Discussion/Possible Action regarding the funds the Senior Center has with the Butler County Area Foundation

County Treasurer, Karey Adamy, and Senior Center Director, Diana McDonald, presented before the board the need to remove the Butler County Area Foundation Funds from the County's financials. Adamy explained that the Senior Center only has the ability to spend the interest that is earned from the account and does not have access to the entire amount. She consulted with the State Auditors office and they agreed the funds should not be included in the county's financials. Moved by Whitmore and seconded by Coufal to remove the Butler County Area Foundation funds from the Senior Centers Savings Fund in the amount of \$77,433.78. Upon roll call vote the following voted aye: Whitmore, Coufal, Svoboda, Krafka, Bauer, and Mach. The following voted nay: NONE. Motion carried.

Discussion/Possible Action regarding upland phragmites

Weed Superintendent, Max Birkel, and Paul Moyer, Nebraska Department of Ag, presented before the board about Upland Phragmites. Birkel explained to the board that farmers don't see this as a threat, so they aren't concerned about getting rid of it. However, the phragmites will eventually block waterways and cause drainage problems. He is proposing the use of a drone to spray the patches because most of the areas are hard to get to. Birkel informed the board there are 2 vendors who do drone spraying in Nebraska. The first has been doing it for a while from McCool Junction and charges \$200/hour. The other from Nebraska City is just getting started and will be charging \$150/hour. The second vendor also wants to map the areas to be sprayed before he comes out to spray. The board asked Birkel how much he will charge to map the area first; even though his rate is cheaper it may take more time and end up costing more. Birkel said that he knows that the vendor from McCool Junction said he would use the county's chemical, so he would say that the chemical is not included in the hourly rate. Birkel told the board he would like to try it for 2 to 3 days and see how much they can get accomplished. The board asked him to get more information regarding the mapping fee.

At 10:48 a.m. the chairman declared the board would take a quick break.

At 10:53 a.m. the board reconvened.

Discussion/Possible action regarding finding additional space for probation

In an earlier meeting Probation had asked the board for more space in the courthouse, as they are currently running out. They proposed the storage room next to where they are currently located. Currently the storage room is being used to store election equipment. Present at the meeting was Wayne Bena, Deputy Secretary of State – Elections Division. He addressed the board stating that he'd toured the areas that were being proposed to move the election equipment and the areas being proposed are not secure, one location is not temperature controlled and that will bake the equipment and the life of the equipment will be altered. He said he also toured the treasurer's office to view the area proposed. The area is not secure and the Clerk's office, which is the only office that should have access to the equipment does not have access to the treasurer's office. He said he likes the area that the equipment is stored now, since the only people that have access are the clerk and her staff. The board said they will have to find other space for probation, however, since there was no one present at the meeting to discuss this with they said they would not take action on the topic.

Discussion/Possible Action – permission for Deputy Reed to travel out of state to pick up K-9

Sheriff Tom Dion appeared before the board to request permission for Deputy Reed to travel out of state August 9th through 10th to travel to Texas to pick up the new K-9. Moved by Whitmore and seconded by Bauer to approve Deputy Reed to travel out of state August 9 through the 10th to pick up the new K-9. Upon roll call vote the following voted aye: Whitmore, Bauer, Krafka, Svoboda, Coufal, and Mach. The following voted nay: NONE. Motion carried.

Distress Warrants

Sheriff Dion presented the Property Tax Distress Warrants for 2019, all have been collected except one that he will continue to try and collect. He informed the board that the total collected was \$17,474.05; and he has \$187.44 uncollected. The report will be placed on file in the Clerk's office.

Discussion/Possible Action – approval to sell 2013 Dodge Charger

Sheriff Dion said that he has an interested individual who would like to purchase the 2013 Dodge Charger. The board asked if he had inquired about selling it on auction. Dion said he had not. The board told Dion to put it on auction and let the individual know that if he wants to purchase it, he can do so through the auction.

Discussion

The board asked Dion where he was with getting everything out of the Old County Yard, he said that he was close and would get it out as soon as possible.

Discussion/Possible Action regarding ADA Compliance officer for Butler County 2021-2022

Laska presented before the board that the compliance officers for last year were Greg Janak, July 1, 2020, through December 31, 2020, and David Mach from January 1, 2021 through June 30, 2021. The board asked if this is something that Heidi Loges, Human Resources Director, could do. Laska said she would investigate this and present at the next meeting. The report is due by August 15, 2021.

Discussion/Possible Action regarding President Biden's Executive Order 14008 also known as the 30 by 30 plan

The board would like to adopt a resolution in opposition of the Executive Order 14008. They reviewed three resolutions from other counties in Nebraska. They asked the clerk to forward the York County Resolution to County Attorney, Julie Reiter, and ask her to draft a resolution for the next meeting.

Laska presented the Dissemination Agent agreement before the board, stating that in the past the board has approved a third party to ensure the county is following the bond reporting requirements; this should have been included with the documents at the last meeting, but it was omitted. WHEREAS, further in Section 216, (i) the Secretary of the Interior, the Secretary of Agriculture, the Secretary of Commerce, through the Administrator of the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration, and the Chair of the Council on Environmental Quality shall, as appropriate, solicit input from State, local, Tribal and territorial officials, agricultural and forest landowners, fishermen, and other key stakeholders in identifying strategies that will encourage broad participation in the goal of conserving 30 percent of our lands and waters by 2030; and

WHEREAS, further in Section 216, (ii) the report to be submitted pursuant to the Executive Order shall propose guidelines for determining whether lands and waters qualify for conservation, and it also shall establish mechanisms to measure progress toward the 30 percent goal; and

BUTLER COUNTY BOARD OF SUPERVISORS

August 31, 2021

A special meeting of the Board of Supervisors of Butler County, Nebraska was held on the 31st day of August 2021 at the Butler County Courthouse Supervisors Meeting Room in David City, Nebraska at 9:00 a.m.

Present were the following: Anthony Whitmore, Scot Bauer, David Mach, Jan Sypal, Robert Coufal, and Ryan Svoboda. Absent: Tony Krafka.

Notice of the meeting was given in advance thereof, by Publication, a designated method for giving notice, as shown by the Proof of Publication attached to the minutes. Notice of this meeting was given to all members of the Board and a copy of their acknowledgement of receipt of notice and the agenda is attached to the minutes. Availability of the agenda was communicated in the advance notice and in the notice to all members of the board of this meeting. All proceedings hereafter shown were taken while the convened meeting was open to the attendance of the public.

The Pledge of Allegiance was recited by all present.

The Chairman called the meeting to order and announced that a complete copy of the Open Meetings Act is posted in the meeting room.

The Chairman declared the minutes from the previous meeting shall stand approved as presented.

Supervisor Mach asked Chairman Whitmore if the Board could observe a moment of silence in honor of the 13 fallen soldiers.

Budget Hearing for 2021-2022

Moved by Svoboda and seconded by Mach to open the Public Hearing for the 2021-2022 County Budget at 9:01 a.m. Upon roll call vote the following voted aye: Svoboda, Bauer, Mach, Sypal, Coufal, and Whitmore. The following voted nay: NONE. Absent: Tony Krafka.

County Clerk, Stephanie Laska, presented a summary of the budget. She noted that she was notified by the assessors' office that a TIF had been paid off by the City of David City therefore understating the county's valuation. The valuation was updated and re-certified to the clerk's office on Friday, August 27, 2021. As a result, the Summary that was published in the Banner Press is not correct and a Summary of Changes will need to be completed within 20 days of the budget being approved by the board. Laska said that publishing a summary of changes is not uncommon especially if changes are made as a result of the budget hearing and or the special tax request hearing. She has reached out to the State auditors office to make sure she is correctly informing the board but had not heard back from them before the meeting. She said she would update the board at the September 7th meeting if anything were to change.

Summary of budget information: The County Valuation was under valued by \$2,745,355. The published levy was .182018; however, with the new information it was reduced to .181813. Compared to last years tax request the 2021-2022 tax request is up 5% or \$204,623.15. This year's tax request is \$4,418,416.59. The levy this year is going up 3% or .00562. The county valuation increased 2% which compensated for only a 3% increase in the levy.

Laska asked the board if they had any additional questions regarding the budget. They did not. Chairman Whitmore asked if there were comments or questions regarding the budget. Molly Hunter, Banner Press, inquired if there was information regarding the TIF that was paid off? Laska said she did not have any information on that. She also asked how the board was going to handle the increased valuation. They said there would be no further changes to the budget, therefore, the increase would be used to reduce the levy.

Roads Update

Isham informed the board that they have installed some last-minute culverts for farmers before harvest. They have also replaced a few culverts that collapsed and needed repair. He is having Jim Novacek go out and inspect several bridges to be placed on the 1-year plan, these bridges will be removed and replaced by culverts. He also informed the board of bridge decking that needs to be replaced by Octavia. He asked the board their thoughts on contracting fuel in the next few months. He also updated that he would be working on getting to Linwood to build up the road to hopefully help the drainage issue in town. Supervisor Sypal informed Isham that she has received several compliments regarding the work done on fairgrounds road and she wanted to pass that along.

At 9:54 a.m. the vice-chairman declared the board would take a quick break.

At 10:00 a.m. the board reconvened.

Discussion/Possible Action regarding the gravel allotment on the roads

Jim Rerucha appeared before the board to once again discuss the possibility of changing the gravel policy to address graveling high traffic roads versus mail route and non-mail route miles. The main discussion focused on mail route miles that only gravel a portion of a mile and the safety issues when there is more gravel on one part of the road compared to the rest of the mile. In discussion, it was suggested that possibly the county would change the whole mile to a mail route and therefore gravel the entire mile. This solution could affect each township allotment. Reiter suggested an interlocal agreement between the county and the township regarding graveling these half mile mail routes. Rerucha said he would go back to the townships and be in touch.

Discussion/Possible Action – Sale of Old Highway Department Property

Reiter said that she had pictures taken of the property, but she asked the board for help in creating the listing. The board also discussed that they wanted all of the Sheriff's evidence transferred to the Hwy 92 building by the October 4, 2021, meeting so they can move forward with the listing and setting a sale date.

Mark Doehling, Emergency Manager, appeared before the board to inform them that he received a grant from the Butler County Area Foundation in the amount of \$1,500; he intends to use that grant money to help purchase a drone for Emergency Management.

Discussion/Possible Action – Moving forward with the communications tower at Highway 92 Building

Doehling presented before the board information regarding installation of a new communications tower at the Highway 92 building. He presented a quote from Shaffer Communications showing the board that the project will cost approximately \$155,000. Bauer asked if his budget could support the project and Doehling said no, he initially budgeted \$100,000 for the project and the board cut the money from his budget. He said he was told if the project was approved, they would look at paying for it out of the Inheritance Fund. The board asked what the balance was in the Inheritance fund and County Clerk, Stephanie Laska reported that there was \$4,292,546.14 as of November 30, 2021. She said that as long as her expenses stay where they are now, she can afford to give the wages, however, one medical bill can throw her budget off. She said she was coming before the board today to ask

permission in the event something would happen, and she might go over budget. The board said they would review her budget in the future if that would happen and to increase her starting wages and current employee wages.

Designate authorized signor for Opioid Litigation settlement registration and supplemental paperwork

County Attorney, Julie Reiter, explained that during a training call with the Attorney General it was explained that the county would need to designate a person to sign the documents for the Opioid Litigation paperwork. She said that she would volunteer to be the signor since the deadline is January 2, 2022, and rather than have someone else sign the paperwork that she will need to review anyway, it will cut out a step and ensure the deadline is met. Moved by Krafka and seconded by Sypal to designate Julie Reiter as the authorized signor for the Opioid Litigation settlement registration and supplemental paperwork. Upon roll call vote the following voted aye: Krafka, Bauer, Sypal, Coufal, Svoboda, and Mach. The following voted nay: NONE. Absent: Whitmore. Motion carried.

Discussion/Possible Action regarding Establishing Salaries for the Elected Officials

Supervisor Whitmore, who was absent due illness, was present via zoom and explained to the board that during the committee meetings the elected officials proposed the 2023 salary for the Assessor, Clerk, Clerk of the District Court, and Treasurer be \$73,550 (15% increase over 2022 of \$61,176) and then a 5% increase each year thereafter. He said he thought that proposal was too high and that he'd called around to like sized counties and inquired what those counties would be doing. Supervisor Sypal was also part of the committee, and she informed the board that at the second

committee meeting the elected officials gave a second proposal that set the 2023 salary at \$70,352 (10% increase over 2022 of \$61,176) and a 5% increase each year thereafter. Also, the County Attorney suggested that the salary be 140% of the Assessor, Clerk, Clerk of the District Court and Treasurer per the NACO recommendation that the County Attorney's wage be 160%, however, since her position is listed at part-time, she is only suggesting 140%. The sheriff said he was fine with the position staying at 120%. The surveyor was asking for the same percentage increase as the 4 elected officials and to include health insurance for his position. Sypal noted that she feels the wages for the elected officials are behind and this proposal would catch them up. Reiter recommended that in the resolution the board approve a 5% increase or CPI increase whichever is greater. Vickie Donoghue, County Assessor, asked the board to look at the position and not the person who currently sits in that office, she also noted that the responsibility of each office continues to grow. The board discussed the salary of the board members and suggested they increase the minimum 3.8% that NACO recommended.

Moved by Sypal and seconded by Coufal to accept the proposed 2023 – 2026 salary set at \$70,352 for 2023 and a 5% increase in each subsequent year for the Assessor, Clerk, Clerk of the District Court and Treasurer, to approve the percentage for the County Attorney's salary to be 140% and the Sheriff's to be 120% of the Assessor, Clerk, Clerk of the District Court and Treasurers salary, with a 5% increase each year after and to approve the Surveyor's salary the same increase as the Assessor, Clerk, Clerk of the District Court and Treasurer as well as add health insurance to the positions benefits and to increase the boards salaries the minimum 3.8% recommended by NACO. Upon roll call vote the following voted aye: Sypal, Coufal, and Svoboda. The following voted nay: Krafka, Bauer and Mach. Absent: Whitmore. Motion failed.

Moved by Krafka and seconded by Bauer to increase all positions 6% over the 2022 salary, leaving the County Attorney and Sheriff at 120% of the Assessor, Clerk, Clerk of the District Court and Treasurer salaries, increase the Surveyor's salary 6% and include health insurance for the position and increase the board salaries the minimum recommended by NACO of 3.8% and increase the salaries 5% each year thereafter. Upon roll call vote the following voted aye: Krafka, Bauer, and Mach. The following voted nay: Sypal, Coufal and Svoboda. Absent: Whitmore. Motion failed.

WHEREAS, the Bruno Rural Fire Protection District No. 7 located in Butler County, Nebraska and Saunders County, Nebraska hereinafter referenced as "Bruno Rural" and the Abie Rural Fire Protection District No. 11 of Butler County, Nebraska hereinafter referenced as "Abie Rural" have both adopted a Joint Resolution to merge the territory within Bruno Rural and the territory within Abie Rural into one (1) new Rural Fire Protection District pursuant to Section 35-516(2) of the Revised Statutes of Nebraska, Reissue 2016; and,

WHEREAS, Section 35-516 of the Revised Statutes of Nebraska, Reissue 2016 provides that two (2) or more Rural Fire Protection Districts may merge; and,

WHEREAS, all requirements of Sections 35-514 of the Revised Statutes have been satisfied to bring about the merger of Bruno Rural and Abie Rural and;

WHEREAS, the merged districts shall be deemed to be organized and operated under sections 35-501 to 35-517.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED AND ORDERED AS FOLLOWS:

- The proposal of the territory within Bruno Rural and the territory within Abie Rural will be merged into one (1) new Rural Fire Protection District pursuant to Section 35-516(2) <u>to be named Skull Creek Rural Fire</u> <u>Protection District</u> and the resulting proposed district is suited to the general fire protection policy of the counties involved, as a whole.
- 2. The boundaries of the proposed district shall be as outlined in the attached map hereto and incorporated herein by reference as if fully set forth and described as Exhibit "A".
- 3. It is ordered that Exhibit "A" referenced above shall be the boundaries of new Fire Protection District encompassing Bruno Rural Fire Protection District No. 7 and Abie Rural Fire Protection District No. 11 and the same shall be filed in the Office of the County Clerk of Butler County, Nebraska wherein this district is situated.

Signing of Resolution 2021-45 Establishing Elected officials' salaries


The elected officials' salaries were voted on and approved at the December 6, 2021 board meeting. Resolution 2021-45 was presented for signatures.

BOARD OF SUPERVISORS BUTLER COUNTY, NEBRASKA RESOLUTION NO. 2021 - 45

WHEREAS, Nebraska Statutes instruct County Supervisors to establish salaries for elected county officials prior to the election year preceding the four-year term during which a person will hold the office.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Butler County Board of Supervisors that the following annual salaries be established.

1. The annual salary for the office of the County Board be established at \$30,616.85 for the calendar year 2023, plus an annual increase of five percent (5%) each year during the term of office (2024, 2025, 2026).

2. The annual salary for the office of the County Clerk be established at \$67,293.60 for the calendar 2023, plus an annual increase of five percent (5%) each year during the term of office (2024, 2025, 2026).

3. The annual salary for the office of the County Treasurer be established at \$67,293.60 for the calendar 2023, plus an annual increase of five percent (5%) each year during the term of office (2024, 2025, 2026).

4. The annual salary for the office of the County Assessor be established at \$67,293.60 for the calendar 2023, plus an annual increase of five percent (5%) each year during the term of office (2024, 2025, 2026).

5. The annual salary for the office of the Clerk of the District Court be established at \$67,293.60 for the calendar 2023, plus an annual increase of five percent (5%) each year during the term of office (2024, 2025, 2026).

6. The annual salary for the office of the County Sheriff be established at \$87,481.68 for the calendar 2023, plus an annual increase of five percent (5%) each year during the term of office (2024, 2025, 2026).

7. The annual salary for the office of the County Attorney be established at \$87,481.68 for the calendar 2023, plus an annual increase of five percent (5%) each year during the term of office (2024, 2025, 2026). The County Attorney position is designated as part-time.

8. The annual salary for the office of the County Surveyor be established at \$20,188.30 for the calendar 2023, plus an annual increase of five percent (5%) each year during the term of office (2024, 2025, 2026). The County Surveyor position is designated as part-time.

9. The annual salaries for the Deputy Clerk, Deputy Assessor, Deputy Clerk of the District Court, Deputy Treasurer and Deputy County Attorney be established at 75% of the Official's salary and shall increase accordingly with the increases in the elected official's salary.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, the county reserves the right to enter into any agreement with an elected official or officials who is qualified to serve as the budget-making authority as may be approved by the Board. It is the intent of the Butler County Board that such agreement shall not constitute an increase in the herein adopted salary but shall be paid to said official or officials as allowed by law.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that in addition to the above stated salary; the County Board of Supervisors, County Clerk, County Treasurer, County Assessor, Clerk of the District Court, County Sheriff, County Attorney and County



Surveyor shall receive all benefits as offered to all county employees including the County's payment toward health and dental plan, or cash in lieu thereof, the same as offered to all county employees.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, if notice of the same be necessary, the county reserves the right to enter into any program for the benefit of employees of the county, any other programs as may be approved, with the right of elected officials and deputies granted to participate in such programs on the effective date of such programs as approved by the board. It is the intent of the Butler County Board of Supervisors that participation in such programs shall not constitute an increase in the herein adopted salary but shall be and is part of such salary as adopted and approved by this resolution.

Update on Roads

Isham updated that they continue to clean ditches as long as the weather will let them and until the frost sets in the ground. They currently have an electrician looking at the generator, Isham informed the board that even if they purchase a new generator a switch will have to be put in, the new generators do not come with them and there will need to be wiring done regardless. They are working to get quotes for the project. The pit is still running as of today, they plan to pull the barge to shore over the holiday weekend and if the lake freezes, they will close the pit until Spring.

Human Resources Update

Heidi Loges, Human Resources Director, discussed with the board the new phone that was being used for the meeting today, she said it is on loan from Applied Connective to see if it helps with the problem of people being unable to hear on zoom during the meeting; she said if it corrected the issue, she would like them to approve the purchase. Loges also discussed with the board regarding the handbook update and how comp time is currently accrued. She informed them

that some people want their overtime split between overtime and comp time and that it becomes difficult for payroll entry and for tracking. She said she and Laska had talked about it, and they would like the employee to decide if the overtime will be paid out or put into comp time, not split. The board discussed and said they thought if an employee deciding on a month-to-month basis was not difficult for bookkeeping that would be their recommendation. Loges said she will address it with the rest of the handbook committee.

Approve & Authorize Chairman to Sign/Butler County Noxious Weed Superintendent Annual State Reports

Max Birkel, Noxious Weed Superintendent appeared before the board to request signing of his annual report, however, he said he has a bit more tweaking to do to the report and he would bring it to the meeting on January 3rd.

Discussion

Birkel updated the board that the state evaluated Butler County and Butler County received 1000 points out of 1000 points on the evaluation. He also mentioned to the Board that he was approached by Seward County about possibly purchasing a drone in the future for spraying upland fragmites. He informed the board that the river fragmites are down significantly because of the weed management they have done on the river. Purchasing the drone would be a significant investment, however, it would help get the upland fragmites under control. The board asked for more information; Birkel will present at a later date.

Discussion/Possible Action – Interlocal agreement to swap mail routes with non-mail routes

Jim Rerucha & Marianne Ziethen representing Union Township appeared before the board. Rerucha discussed wanting to swap one mail route, Road 31 between L & M with one non mail route, Road J between 32 & 33. He asked for help creating the interlocal and what the next steps are. County Attorney, Julie Reiter, asked Jim to bring the information to her and she could draw up an interlocal, she would not have it ready by the next meeting, however, she thought she could have it ready by the second meeting in January. Isham said he could bring her the information.

Discussion/Possible Action – Sale of Old Highway Department Property

Whitmore explained that the sale of the property did not happen due to no one bidding. He asked Reiter what the next steps were; she informed the board that they could start over with another auction and she complete the sale, or they could hire a realtor and they would have the resources to reach out beyond Butler County. The board discussed that they believe there is local interest, but they needed to lower the floor. At the next meeting on January 3^{rd,} they will set dates and times for the public hearing and the sale of the property.

Committee Reports

Svoboda reported he attended the Butler County Development meeting and said that AKRS is planning to expand on the north side of David City. The board is still trying to determine the best location for a hotel, on the north or the south side of David City.

Sypal asked Laska if there was an update regarding Four Corners and Dr. Papineau coming before the board to answer questions. Laska said that she spoke to them before the December 6 board meeting, and they would not be able to attend then but would be in touch to possibly attend the December 20th meeting and no one contacted her.
