Accept Wheel Loader Bid

Highway Superintendent, Randy Isham, appeared before the board to recommend the county accept and purchase the John Deere 624 Wheel loader from Murphy Tractor for \$205,000. They were able to demo almost all the machines and that machine was the one preferred by Randy and his employees. Isham noted that the frost is starting to set in, but they are going to continue to clean ditches until the ground is completely frozen. They will then put the shredder on the loader and start shredding trees throughout the county. The pit is closed, they have the equipment pulled off the barge. He believes there are 3 to 4 years left at the pit.

Approve & Authorize Chairman to sign/Butler County Noxious Weed Superintendent Annual State Reports

Max Birkel, Noxious Weed Superintendent, appeared before the board to present his annual report. He noted that currently Butler County has zero open files, which is one of the first times in many years that has happened. He also noted that the river fragmites are going down while the upland fragmites are increasing. Moved by Mach and seconded by Sypal to approve the annual report as presented. Upon roll call vote the following voted aye: Mach, Sypal, Coufal, Svoboda, Krafka, Bauer, and Whitmore. The following voted nay: NONE. Motion carried.

Human Resources Update

Heidi Loges, Human Resources Director, appeared before the board to give her update. She discussed with the board the topic of the Chamber bucks and that Whitmore had requested one office do them every year so that they can go out with the paychecks, and we aren't mailing them to employees and save on postage. It was discussed that when the topic comes up next year, they can discuss it further then. Loges also discussed with the board about updating the handbook regarding phone stipends. The board said they thought only department supervisors got the phone stipend. They decided to table the topic for a later date.

Loges appeared before the board to discuss with the board regarding moving the county from monthly payroll to biweekly or semi-monthly. She noted she has had several employees inquire about it. Mach mentioned that the county has a resolution to pay employees an advance if they request it. Isham mentioned that for some it is difficult to start and

wait two months for a paycheck; he also mentioned that the resolution is nice but getting advance payment shorts their next check when they do get it. The board asked Loges and County Clerk, Stephanie Laska, with the new payroll system, if it is easier and if they could move to bi-weekly or semi-monthly. They said that the timeclock system works for clocking in and out, but they are still having issues with the system when performing payroll. It was also noted that adding additional payrolls adds additional time to all department heads regarding verifying payroll. Laska noted that approximately 3 days goes into the monthly payroll now, adding payroll would add more days spent on payroll. The board discussed and said they think it should stay monthly and asked for the topic to be put back on the agenda for a vote at the next meeting.

Sale of Old Highway Department/Set Date & Time for Public Hearing regarding the sale of the Old Highway Department Property/Set Date & Time to sell Old Highway Department property

An interlocal agreement for the County library cards with the City of David City was presented before the board. Moved by Mach and seconded by Sypal to approve the interlocal agreement as presented. Upon roll call vote the following voted aye: Mach, Sypal, Svoboda, Krafka, Bauer, and Whitmore. The following voted nay: NONE. Absent: Coufal. Motion carried.

Discussion/Possible Action regarding contract with Stop Inn Speedee Mart and Butler County

County Attorney Julie Reiter, explained to the board that whenever an elected official has a financial interest regarding County business, they need to declare it in an open meeting and place the Contractual Interest Statement Form C-3 on file in the clerk's office. The declaration needs to be made during open meeting and reflected as such. Supervisor Sypal has filed Form C-3 with the Clerk's office and is making known her Contractual interest today in the open meeting.

Discussion/Possible Action – Interlocal agreement between the Butler County Sheriff's office and the Village of Surprise

An interlocal agreement between the Butler County Sheriff's office and the Village of Surprise was presented before the board. Moved by Mach and seconded by Krafka to approve the agreement as presented. Upon roll call vote the following voted aye: Mach, Bauer, Krafka, Svoboda, Sypal, and Whitmore. The following voted nay: NONE. Absent: Coufal. Motion carried.

Southeast Nebraska Collaborative Annual Update

Collena Laschanzky appeared before the board and gave the Southeast Nebraska Collaborative annual update. Appearing with her was Julie Allen from Cornhusker United Way; she also gave a report to the board and requested they write a letter of support for Cornhusker United Way.

Discussion/Possible Action regarding a gravel stockpile behind Oak Creek Township Shed

Highway Superintendent, Randy Isham, appeared before the board to discuss whether or not the Roads Department should rent more land behind the Oak Creek Township Shed for gravel stockpiling or stockpile the gravel at the Hwy 92 location and not pay additional rent for the ground. The board agreed that they should stockpile the gravel at the Hwy 92 location rather than paying additional money towards a lease.

Discussion about the gravel pit expenses and the future of the pit

Isham informed the board that there are probably 3-4 years left at the current gravel pit, however, at this moment they are needing significant repairs on the pit equipment. They need a new motor, cutter head and sand pump; all of those repairs or equipment purchases combined will be around \$75,000. He said that he wanted to inform the board of the situation because these expenses don't usually all hit at once. He said by the next meeting he will have solid numbers as to what it costs to run the pit and what it saves the county in gravel purchases to operate a pit. The board requested more information from Isham and asked for this to be put on the agenda for the next meeting.

Discussion/Possible Action regarding a fuel contract

Isham asked the board if he should recontract fuel; their current contract has 22,000 gallons left at \$1.75 per gallon. He said that if he contracts today, he will contract at \$2.97 per gallon. He believes that the current contract will get the Roads department to Spring. The board discussed fuel prices and told Isham to contract enough to get him to Summer. Moved by Sypal and seconded by Svoboda to contract an additional 20,000 gallons of fuel. Upon roll call vote the following voted aye: Sypal, Svoboda, Krafka, Bauer, and Whitmore. The following voted nay: Mach. Absent: Coufal. Motion carried.

Update on Roads

Isham reported that he only has the motor graders out maintaining intersections and trying to work out the wash boards. The dirt crew is done for the season. They continue to stockpile gravel. He did send out employees to clear roads after the snow. Sypal asked if Isham had posted anything in the paper yet regarding County Right of ways. Isham said he had not yet but planned to closer to Spring.

Discussion/Possible Action regarding the 911 Communications Tower

Emergency Manager, Mark Doehling appeared before the board to discuss the 911 Communications Tower. He informed them that he had been in contact with Mark Kirby at Butler Public Power District, and they are doing a broadband study and they may work together to get the tower put up. He said he will inform the board when he has more information.



Discussion – Garrison emergency siren

Doehling also mentioned that he had been approached by the Village of Garrison regarding their siren and being able to have it turned on by Dispatch. He said that the capability to do that will cost \$5,000; however, that is not something that Emergency Management takes care of, that it typically falls under fire protection and that would fall under David City Fire Protection District.

Discussion/Possible Action – Employees requesting bi-weekly or bi-monthly payroll

The discussion regarding paying employees bi-weekly or bi-monthly was discussed again. A survey was done amongst the Sheriff's office, Dispatch and the Detention center and several employees were in favor of moving to bi-weekly or semi-monthly. County Clerk, Stephanie Laska, informed the board if they decide to make the change, she would be asking to hire another person part-time in her office to accommodate the added workload. Sypal asked Laska what it would roughly cost to hire additional staff. Laska said an additional employee paid at minimum \$16 per hour would be \$16,640 in salary; health insurance would be approximately \$10,824; you would also have to include retirement match and employer taxes. At minimum that additional employee would cost \$30,000. County Attorney, Julie Reiter added that it adds additional time to each department heads responsibilities; they would be reviewing payroll at least twice a month instead of the one time a month now. Moved by Krafka and seconded by Bauer to keep payroll monthly. Upon roll call vote the following voted aye: Krafka, Bauer, Mach, Sypal, Svoboda, and Whitmore. The following voted nay: NONE. Absent: Coufal. Motion carried.

Discussion regarding Region V lease

County Attorney Julie Reiter explained to the board that County Assessor Vickie Donoghue had brought the lease between Butler County and Region V to her attention. Along with the lease being brought to her attention it was questioned as to whom owned the building. It has been determined that the county owns the land and the buildings. It was also determined that the county has not billed the annual lease payment, nor has it insured the property. Since the discovery, the property has been added to the county's insurance. Reiter asked the board if they were interested in updating the lease since the last time it was updated was its installation in 1982. The board said yes and Svoboda and Sypal will be contacting Region V to see if they would be agreeable to updating the lease as well.

Discussion/Possible Action – Interlocal agreement between the Butler County Sheriff's office and the Village of Surprise Continued

Reiter wanted to re-address the interlocal agreement between the Sheriff's Office and the Village of Surprise. She said that all interlocal agreements in which the county bills another entity needs to be communicated with the County Treasurers Office, so that they know what they need to be collecting. She asked the Sheriff to make sure when they bill the villages that they let the Treasurer know.

Discussion/Possible Action regarding contract with Stop Inn Speedee Mart and Butler County

Reiter wanted to readdress the contract with Stop Inn Speedee Mart again; she asked the board to vote that they'd received Supervisor Sypal's disclosure. Moved by Svoboda and seconded by Bauer to accept Supervisor Sypal's disclosure of the non-exclusive open-ended contract between Butler County and Stop Inn Speedee Mart. Upon roll call vote the following voted aye: Svoboda, Krafka, Bauer, Mach, and Whitmore. The following voted nay: NONE. Abstain: Sypal. Absent: Coufal. Motion carried.

At 10:15 a.m. the chairman declared the board would take a quick break.

At 10:17 a.m. the board reconvened.

Discussion regarding being a part of Four Corners Health Department

Supervisor Sypal expressed her concern with the handling of the COVID-19 pandemic. She handed out an article that was printed in the York Newspaper. Sypal recounted some of her meetings with others in the community and gave examples of how some had felt threatened by Four Corners.

Laura McDougall, Executive Director of Four Corners Health District was present. She explained that at no time during the pandemic did she or any of her employees threaten anyone, nor did they recommend enforcement of the Directed Health Measures that were put in place by the Governor.

Members of the public speaking in favor of Four Corners Health District were as follows: Dr. Denker, David City Public Schools Superintendent, Skip Trowbridge, representing members and businesses in the community, and Don Naiberk, CEO of the Butler County Health Care Center.

Correspondence in favor of Four Corners from members of the public were read aloud from the following: Trish Steager, Administrator of St. Joseph's Villa and Court and Trudy Samek. Copies of these emails will be on file in the clerk's office for review upon request.

Sypal explained that her intent was not to leave Four Corners, but to hold them accountable for their actions and to remind them they are here for everyone in the community.

Four Corners Annual Update

Presented before the board was a handout pertaining to Four Corners Health District and their annual update.

Discussion/Possible Action regarding the appointment of Elizabeth Papineau, DDS to the health board

Moved by Bauer and seconded by Mach to appoint Elizabeth Papineau, DDS to the health board for Four Corners Health District. Upon roll call vote the following voted aye: Bauer, Mach, Krafka and Whitmore. The following voted nay: Sypal and Svoboda. Absent: Coufal. Motion carried.

Discussion/Possible Action - Replacement of benches in front of the courthouse

County Clerk, Stephanie Laska, updated the board on her findings regarding the benches that were previously in front of the courthouse. She reported that she was informed they were in disrepair, and they were hauled away. The board asked for additional quotes for the benches and an updated quote from the current vendor since it dates back to November. The topic was tabled for a later date.

Update on legislation affecting Nebraska Inheritance Tax

County Attorney, Julie Reiter, discussed with the board the current legislation regarding Inheritance tax. She encouraged the board to continue to reach out to their senators regarding keeping the tax and how the county relies on the tax.

Discussion

Whitmore discussed with the board that he was contacted by NACO regarding monthly meetings with our senators. He mentioned that he suggested that Bauer and/or Krafka meet with Senator Kolterman since they both live in his district now that Butler County has been split.

Claims

The board reviewed the claims list presented. Moved by Sypal and seconded by Mach to approve the claims as presented. Upon roll call vote the following voted aye: Sypal, Mach, Bauer, Krafka, Svoboda, and Whitmore. The following voted nay: NONE. Absent: Coufal. Motion carried.

Discussion

Questions arose regarding Butler County now being in two legislative districts. The board asked Laska to explain. She explained that due to the Census and redistricting the Legislature has now split Butler County, the split is down the

township boundaries; now Alexis, Summit, Reading and Read all fall in Legislative District 24 and the remainder of Butler County still falls into District 23.

Committee Reports

Svoboda reported that the Landfill had contacted him regarding meeting to discuss the expansion.

Present were the following: Anthony Whitmore, Tony Krafka, Scot Bauer, David Mach, Jan Sypal, Robert Coufal, and Ryan Svoboda.

Notice of the meeting was given in advance thereof, by Publication, a designated method for giving notice, as shown by the Proof of Publication attached to the minutes. Notice of this meeting was given to all members of the Board and a copy of their acknowledgement of receipt of notice and the agenda is attached to the minutes. Availability of the agenda was communicated in the advance notice and in the notice to all members of the board of this meeting. All proceedings hereafter shown were taken while the convened meeting was open to the attendance of the public.

The Pledge of Allegiance was recited by all present.

The Chairman called the meeting to order and announced that a complete copy of the Open Meetings Act is posted in the meeting room.

The Chairman declared the minutes from the previous meeting shall stand approved as presented.

Chairman Whitmore asked for a moment of silence for Kroy Vandenberg.

Public Hearing – Intent to sell county property located at 1329 36th Road David City, Nebraska

Moved by Mach and seconded by Coufal to open the public hearing regarding the intent to sell county property located at 1329 36th Road David City, Nebraska at 9:01 a.m. Upon roll call vote the following voted aye: Mach, Sypal, Coufal, Svoboda, Krafka, Bauer, and Whitmore. The following voted nay: NONE. Motion carried.

Chairman Whitmore asked if there were any questions or comments from the public. Questions regarding fuel storage and contamination arose. It was explained that there were problems at one time, however; testing was completed and signed off by the NDEQ and the wells have since been capped. Whitmore stated they would keep the hearing open for a while longer and move on to other business.

Discussion/Possible action regarding allowing Max Birkel, Noxious Weed Superintendent to stay overnight in Norfolk for the NWCA Conference Monday, February 7 through Wednesday, February 9.

Moved by Mach and seconded by Sypal to allow Max Birkel, Noxious Weed Superintendent to stay overnight in Norfolk for the NWCA Conference Monday, February 7 through Wednesday, February 9. Upon roll call vote the following voted aye: Mach, Sypal, Coufal, Svoboda, Krafka, Bauer, and Whitmore. The following voted nay: NONE. Motion carried.

Discussion/Possible Action regarding the Garrison tornado sirens

Emergency Manager, Mark Doehling, appeared before the board with a quote for the tornado siren in Garrison. The quote he presented was \$3,894.95. He said he thought it would be less since there is already a siren in Garrison. He again told the board that Butler County doesn't typically have funding for this type of project and that usually the Villages and Rural Fire Boards pay for it. Bauer said he called around and found out the same information, that the villages or the rural fire boards pay for the sirens. Moved by Svoboda to have the county pay for the cost of the sirens and installation and pay for it using the Inheritance fund. Chairman Whitmore asked for a second. Bauer said he felt there needs to be more research on the issues before the county takes on the project. Svoboda withdrew his motion. The topic was tabled until the next meeting.

Discussion about the gravel pit expenses and the future of the pit

Highway Superintendent, Randy Isham, reported to the board that in the last fiscal year the gravel pit cost the county approximately \$10.91 per cubic yard of gravel pumped. He said that there were more repairs and labor at the gravel pit in the last year and that in previous years the pit cost less. He said realistically the pit costs approximately \$9.73 per cubic yard. These numbers are significantly less than the average \$16.49 per cubic yard that they can purchase from other gravel pits. He said the pit roughly saves the county \$125,000 to \$150,000 depending on which pit the gravel is purchased from. He also reported that the repairs to the pump and cutter head will be less than he reported at the last meeting. At the last meeting he estimated it would cost \$75,000 to repair everything. It is now estimated that it will cost approximately \$60,000. The board discussed the repairs. Moved by Mach and seconded by Bauer to fix the pump and cutter head. Upon roll call vote the following voted aye: Mach, Bauer, Krafka, Svoboda, Coufal, Sypal, and Whitmore. The following voted nay: NONE. Motion carried.

Update on Roads

He said that Columbus currently handles Polk County 911 dispatching and overall, the feedback he received was positive. He said the price is based on call volume and Polk currently pays \$150,000 per year. He thought it might be something Butler County might want to look into in the future. Upon further discussion, Krafka was going to get more information and the other supervisors were going to contact the fire departments to get their perspective on the situation.

He said that the total points you can get is 3,400 points and that is also the minimum, if you get less, you have deficiencies in the county. Heidi Loges, Human Resources Director, informed the board that they would be doing interviews for the 911 coordinator starting at 11:30 today. Loges explained that she and Leigh Edwards were working to keep dispatch running smoothly in the interim until they hire a new coordinator.

Moved by Bauer and seconded by Coufal to exit the Board of Equalization at 9:08 a.m. Upon roll call vote the following voted aye: Bauer, Mach, Sypal, Coufal, Svoboda, Krafka, and Whitmore. The following voted nay: NONE. Motion carried.

Approval of employee re-hire in 911 Emergency Management Dispatch

Loges appeared before the board to request that the county re-hire Cassidy Meysenburg as a 911 Dispatcher. She previously left to go to school and has agreed to come back as a part-time on call employee in the event that dispatch would have a staffing issue. She explained that currently there is an employee out on medical leave and in order to cover shifts she has at least one dispatcher scheduled for 200 hours in April. The staff has been pretty good about covering shifts, but there may be a time when no one can cover, and they need a backup. Moved by Sypal and seconded

by Coufal to approve the re-hire of Cassidy Meysenburg on an on-call basis. Further discussion as to whether the new 911 coordinator should be the one hiring these people was asked and whether the applicants from the coordinator should be considered. Loges said that Meysenburg will need a refresher course to make sure she is brought up to speed on any changes since she was last employed, and most of the candidates would need training that takes at least 30 days. Scott Steager, former supervisor and 911 coordinator, said that it is not uncommon to have part-time on call/as needed employees. They don't affect the budget unless you need them. Chairman Whitmore called for a vote. Upon roll call vote the following voted aye: Sypal, Coufal, Svoboda, and Whitmore. The following voted nay: Krafka, Bauer, and Mach. Motion carried.

Discussion/Possible Action – Sale of the Shelby Clinic

County Attorney, Julie Reiter, explained to the board that the Shelby Clinic is County owned, however, when it was purchased the Hospital was the one who actually paid for it. She also said that the Village of Shelby still wants to purchase the building. Since the sale will be between political subdivisions the county only needs to publish their intent to sell. The agreed upon amount between the Hospital and the Village of Shelby is \$20,000 which is \$5,000 less than previously agreed upon before the water damage that happened. The repairs have been made due to the water damage. Reiter presented a new purchase agreement with the new terms and has asked the board to consider and authorize the chairman to sign. Moved by Mach and seconded by Krafka to approve the purchase agreement as presented and authorize the chairman to sign. Approval to allow the Department of Homeland Security Cyber & Infrastructure (CISA) to run CISA Assessments to assess the health of internet-accessible assets

County Clerk, Stephanie Laska, explained she had been contacted by the Secretary of State's office regarding cyber security and they explained that the DHS will perform assessments on the cyber hygiene of the county for free to make sure that our network is secure. She also said she contacted Applied Connective about this to make sure they agreed this would be a good idea and she received an email from them saying that this would be very helpful. Supervisor Sypal said at the last hospital meeting Cindy Neesen presented to them that they had this done and it was a great service. Moved by Sypal and seconded by Svoboda to allow DHS to perform the CISA assessments. Upon roll call vote the following voted aye: Sypal, Coufal, Svoboda, Krafka, Bauer, Mach, and Whitmore. The following voted nay: NONE. Motion carried.

Emergency Manager, Mark Doehling, informed the board that the emergency management group the county belongs to has acquired grant funds to pay for cyber security and the group had recently heard about these assessments as well.

Discussion/Possible Action regarding approval of ARPA Funds request approvals for rural fire districts and Emergency Management Tower

Whitmore gave a committee report explaining that the ARPA committee has met with a couple different groups regarding ARPA fund requests. He said the committee will be attending the Butler Public Power Board meeting on May 10th regarding an upcoming project they want to talk about. Today the committee wants to suggest fund approvals for the Rural Fire Districts and the Emergency Management Tower. He said that the fire districts requested \$750,000 from the county and they are suggesting \$300,000. Sypal pointed out that the fire districts were in the middle of the COVID pandemic and on the front lines. It was mentioned that the funds could be distributed the same way the MFO funds are distributed; they go to the MFO bookkeeper and then they are distributed by percentage of population. Laska mentioned that each district would need to track how they spend the money because she will need that information for annual reporting. Moved by Sypal and seconded by Bauer to approve \$300,000 of the ARPA funds be distributed to the rural fire districts. Upon roll call vote the following voted aye: Sypal, Mach, Bauer, Krafka, Svoboda, Coufal, and Whitmore. The following voted nay: NONE. Motion carried.

Discussion/Possible Action regarding a utility permit for Northeast Nebraska Telephone Company to plow their fiber optic line on Road 22 between Roads N & O

Moved by Mach and seconded by Coufal to approve the utility permit as presented. Upon roll call vote the following voted aye: Mach, Sypal, Coufal, Svoboda, Krafka, Bauer, and Whitmore. The following voted nay: NONE. Motion carried.

Update on Roads

Isham reported that they are half done cleaning the ditches on the Landfill Road and then they are moving to Ulysses for a project, from Ulysses they will head to Alexis Township to unplug culverts. He also reported that he was contacted Saturday (4/16) morning regarding 5 stop signs being ran over, the Sheriff's Department is aware and will be looking into it. Sypal asked Isham about a concern that was brought to her on Road 43 and S regarding the motor grader and who takes care of the road. Isham explained that S road is a dividing line for townships and that a motor grader operator will go to that intersection and turn around. She said she would address the concern with the individual. Zach Happel with Nebraska Machinery appeared before the board to inform them that the current state bid is good through June 26, 2022. He also informed them that they have been notified that a motor grader will likely increase between \$30,000 and

\$40,000 for the next contract. He also said that Murphy is currently 6 months out for orders, so if a machine is ordered now, you pay the current contracted rate when it is delivered. Isham said he may be losing another township and getting that motor grader, therefore, he's not in the market right now. Happel just wanted the board to be aware.

Discussion/Possible Action regarding approval of ARPA Fund request approvals for rural fire districts and Emergency Management Tower continued

Emergency Manager, Mark Doehling appeared before the board with a map of the county showing the current towers and the tower he is suggesting. He said the quote he received back in November 2021 was for \$150,000; he's unsure of what it would be today. Mark Sloup, David City Fire Chief, was present and mentioned that if the board approves the tower, that instead of moving the jail repeater off the Yanka elevator that the fire department would be interested in buying it and the county could buy a new one for the new tower. The board asked Doehling to get an updated quote and they would discuss at the next board meeting on May 2, 2022.

Discussion about the possibility of paving J Road by Ulysses

Leander Stara appeared before the board to discuss paving J Road by Ulysses. He informed the board that 60 years ago he was told not to put his fence near the road because the road was going to be hard surfaced and 60 years later it's still a gravel road. He explained that when the Co-Op hauled out grain it was so dusty that oncoming traffic would have to stop because they could not see. The board asked Isham to speak about the area. Isham said that the cost of paving the road is very expensive, however, he could look into dust control for the area and that would help keep the dust down for traffic. Mr. Stara thanked the board for their time and exited the meeting.

Committee Reports

Sypal reported that the Hospital board met, and they were informed that the Four Corners Health Department Board President was released from services due to her comments made to a newspaper during the COVID pandemic. She also reported that the hospital is looking to expand to the North and has recently purchased a home where they will allow doctors, nurses, and interns to stay instead of getting hotel lodging.

Whitmore reported that he went to the Village of Ulysses meeting regarding ARPA funds. They will try to apply for their funds, but they may be too late.

At 9:56 a.m. the chairman declared the board would take a quick break.

At 10:00 a.m. the board reconvened.

Discussion/Possible Action regarding employee wages at the Senior Center

Senior Center Director, Diana McDonald, appeared before the board to request increasing her staff's wages. She presented the board with a list of Butler County employees and their wages, noting that her staff were the lowest paid employees, and she has a great group, and she wants to keep them. The board agreed she needed to increase their

wages. She is requesting anywhere from a 10% to a 25% increase in her staff wages. Current wages and proposed wages are as follows:

Driver & Backup Cook	\$10.71/hour requesting a 15% increase to \$12.32/hour
Assistant Kitchen	\$11.15/hour requesting a 15% increase to \$12.83/hour
Head Cook	\$11.04/hour requesting a 25% increase to \$13.80/hour
Assistant Manager	\$12.70/hour requesting a 25% increase to \$15.88/hour

Supervisor Mach doesn't think that the increase is enough, that the Senior Center is very valuable to the County, and they all need at least a dollar more an hour than what McDonald has proposed. Whitmore asked McDonald if her budget could handle the increases. She said that her personnel lines could not, however, she could absorb it in another portion of her budget. Sypal suggested that they approve the requested wages now and at budget time re-address the wages again. Moved by Sypal and seconded by Mach to approve the proposed wages at this time and re-address at budget time. Upon roll call vote the following voted aye: Sypal, Mach, Bauer, Krafka, Svoboda, Coufal, and Whitmore. The following voted nay: NONE. Motion carried.

Loges explained to the board that she had been approached by Leigh Edwards, Interim 911 Coordinator, that she would like the dispatchers removed from the process of handling money for the gun permits and the title inspections and have the Sheriff's department be the only department that handles the money since it is part of the Sheriff's Department. The board agreed and asked Laska to put it on the next agenda to allow the board to vote on the topic.

There being no further business to come before the board, the Chairman adjourned the meeting at 10:39 a.m. The next scheduled meeting of the Board of Supervisors will be May 2, 2022 at 9:00 a.m.

Discussion/Possible Action regarding approval of ARPA Funds request approvals for the Emergency Management Tower

Emergency Manager Mark Doehling appeared before the board and asked to move this topic to the next meeting on May 16, 2022; he was unable to get an updated quote for the tower since the last meeting. Concern from the public regarding studies and the need for this tower were brought before the board, as a result a committee was set up consisting of Supervisors Sypal and Coufal, Doehling, Scott Steager, Rick Schneider, Matt Gangwish and Bob McLaughlin.

Region V Systems Annual Update

C.J. Johnson, Region V Systems Regional Administrator, appeared via zoom before the board to give the Region V Systems annual update.

Whitmore explained that Highway Superintendent, Randy Isham, came before the ARPA committee to discuss the funding and request funds for bridges and culverts. His initial request was for \$750,000. The ARPA committee is recommending the county approve \$500,000 of the ARPA funds for Bridges and Culverts only. Moved by Mach and seconded by Bauer to approve the request of \$500,000 of the ARPA funds for the Roads Department, they can use it on Bridges & Culverts only. Update on Roads

Isham informed the board that he has been out checking roads with the rain that the county has received, and the roads seem to be holding up well. There are a few spots that have needed gravel and they will be getting the gravel this week. Isham discussed with the board some phone calls he had received in the last week and over the weekend regarding the chicken houses and the haul route that the townships and the Chicken houses had discussed. He said that there was never a haul route agreement signed between the chicken houses and the county, therefore, he has no enforcement authority on the public roads. Isham also said they are almost done cleaning ditches on the landfill road and they've also been cleaning some ditches in Alexis Township.

Discussion regarding the Champ MEC Plan

Eric Hancock, Anchor Insurance appeared before the board; he said he was not there to replace the county's health insurance, he was there to present a plan to enhance the plan the county has. He presented information regarding the Champ MEC Plan Anchor insurance has to offer. He said if the board has questions, he could come back to a meeting to discuss those questions at a later date.

Discussion/Possible action regarding hiring the 911 Coordinator

The 911 coordinator committee recommended the hiring of Jeff Timmerman as the new 911 Coordinator, and they recommend his wage to be \$26 per hour. Moved by Mach and seconded by Coufal to hire Jeff Timmerman as the Butler County 911 Coordinator at \$26 per hour. Upon roll call vote the following voted aye: Mach, Coufal, Svoboda, Krafka, Bauer, and Whitmore. The following voted nay: Sypal. Motion carried.

Discussion/Possible action – Approval to pay for dispatcher training software APCO EMD

Leigh Edwards, Interim 911 Coordinator appeared before the board to discuss training for the dispatchers. She reported that training will be mandatory in the future, and they are trying to get ahead of the curve. She also said that there are funds in the 911 Wireless Savings account that they can use, however, they need to get permission from the Public Service Commission. The quote from APCO EMD is approximately \$30,000; the board asked her to get informal quotes from the other two vendors before they make a decision. When she has the other quotes the board will discuss again.

Discussion/Possible action regarding ending the Zuercher contract

Chairman Whitmore presented that he and Supervisor Bauer, Sheriff Dion, and several of his staff members and Leigh Edwards met with Justice Data Solutions (JDS) regarding their software package that could replace the current software and Zuercher. He explained that the investment would be significantly less than Zuercher and that JDS is compliant with Nebraska Jail Standards and the National Incident-Based Reporting System (NIBRS). Whitmore also reported that the county had paid approximately \$93,000 to Zuercher and still owed around \$23,000. The question today is do we continue and stay with Zuercher or does the county make the switch to JDS. It was discussed that Butler County is in an interlocal agreement and they are bound to that interlocal and the fees set forth in that agreement for 60 months. Employees from Seward and York County were present to discuss Zuercher and how it is working for their counties. Both counties agreed it has been a long process, but now that they are live and working with the software, they are very comfortable with it. Moved by Krafka and seconded by Sypal to stay with Zuercher. Upon roll call vote the following voted aye: Krafka, Mach and Sypal. The following voted nay: Bauer, Coufal, Svoboda, and Whitmore. Problem Solving Court Presentation

Rodriguez presented before the board an interlocal agreement for Problem Solving Court between Butler County, Saunders County and Colfax County. This agreement will replace the current agreement. She also introduced Judge Marroquin and let her speak about Problem Solving Court. Also appearing before the board were Jeanetta & Thomas Albers, graduates of Problem Solving Court. Highway Superintendent, Randy Isham, discussed with the board the future need of an interlocal agreement with the City of David City. He discussed the necessity of clearing and salting the road up to the Timpte entrance because that is where they can safely turn around, but also the liability of making sure that road is safe to travel. The board agreed with his concerns and said that once he has the agreement to bring it to them for a vote.
